Red Cross Talk At Rotary Club

Mrs. Emma May Erickson, of the San Francisco headquarters of the Red Cross, was the guest speaker at the noon luncheon of the Rotary Club in L.O.O.F.F. hall on Wednesday.

Walter Chiens, of Marshfield, first introduced Lou Blanc, chairman of Coos County Red Cross, who gave a brief outline of the work in Coos county and the plans for the drive now coming up for funds for the present year. Mr. Chiens then introduced Mrs. Erickson as the principal speaker.

Mrs. Erickson told of the enormous activities of the organization during the past year when they spent \$125,000,000, 87 per cent of which was spent on the men at the front and that their work showed an increase of twenty-one times over that of 1940 and that this year they are asking for \$200,000,000 to carry on their work of which Coos county's quota is \$31,416.

She stated that the Red Cross is maintaining 350 clubs for the men besides 85 clubmobiles, which are clubs on wheels which can be transported close up behind the front lines.

The Red Cross also maintains a half dozen transports, which handle the supplies for the men and also the vast number of boxes which are being sent to all allied prisoners in axis concentration camps, and has also conducted the exchange of prisoners on the Gripsholm. So far the Red Cross' efforts to have boxes of food supplies delivered to the prisoners in Jap camps, have proved unavailing through lack of cooperation by the Japs.

Mrs. Erickson displayed a sample of the boxes sent to prisoners and showed the contents to the assembled group.
