Powers must know radio-telephone procedure as well as radiotelegraphy to carry on at a job that demands intense concentration, split-second thinking, and sound judgment, since it is his responsibility to see that

aircraft operate on schedule over the airways. As part of the Army Airways Communication System which furnishes such control both in this country and in foreign areas, he is making a very real contribution to the war effort.

W. L. Kistner, Coquille, entered for treatment and Merlin Spencer, Marshfield, underwent an appendectomy on Tuesday.

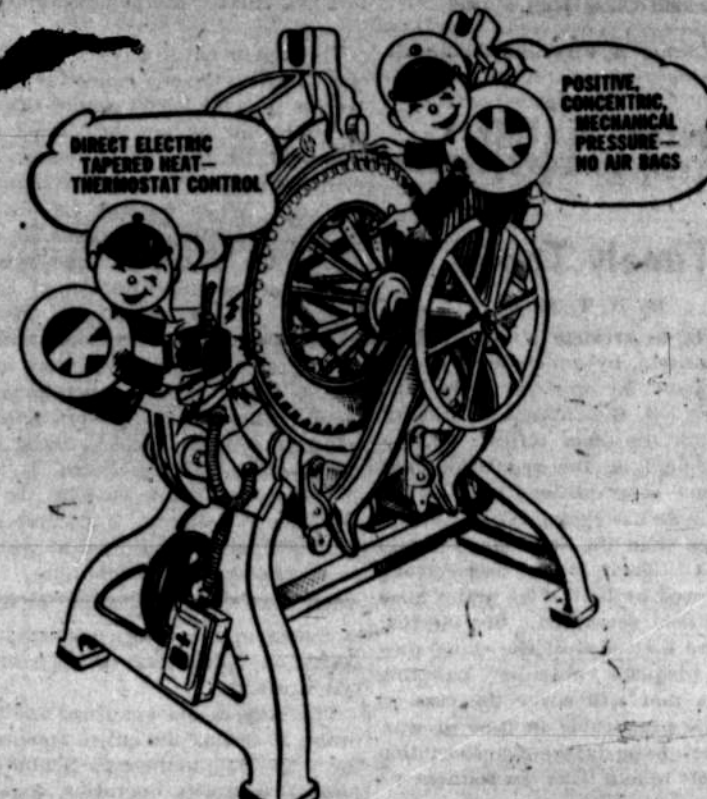
Mrs. Basil Arnold entered the hospital Wednesday morning for a tonsilectomy.
