**Consequence Of Innocent Violation Of The Price Control Program**

One of the highest courts in the country, in a recent decision, determined some of the consequences of unintentional violations of OPA regulations and stated the reasons back of those consequences. The case involved a suit for \$50 by a housewife who had been charged 14c for a can of soup, when the ceiling price was 10c. The suit was brought under the provision of the Price Control Act, which says that any consumer who is charged more than ceiling price, may sue for \$50 or three times the overcharge, whichever is more, plus attorney fees and costs fixed by the court. The store which was being sued admitted the 4c overcharge, but claimed that the soup was marked 14c by mistake, and that thus it should not have to pay the \$50. The court held it makes no difference that the overcharge was a mistake because the Price Control Act, which is a law passed by our Congress to prevent inflation, requires the court to order and the store to pay the consumer \$50 when there is an overcharge.

The court went on to say that in putting this provision in the Act, Congress felt "that occasional hard-

ship to one who honestly and intelligently endeavors to comply with the law is not too high a price to pay for the protection of the whole community against inflation."

This indicates how aware Congress, which is composed of our representatives, was of the very real dangers of inflation, and it serves to remind us all, as the court says, that "innocent non-conformity with the Price Control Act is as inflationary and as damaging to competitors and the public as guilty non-conformity."

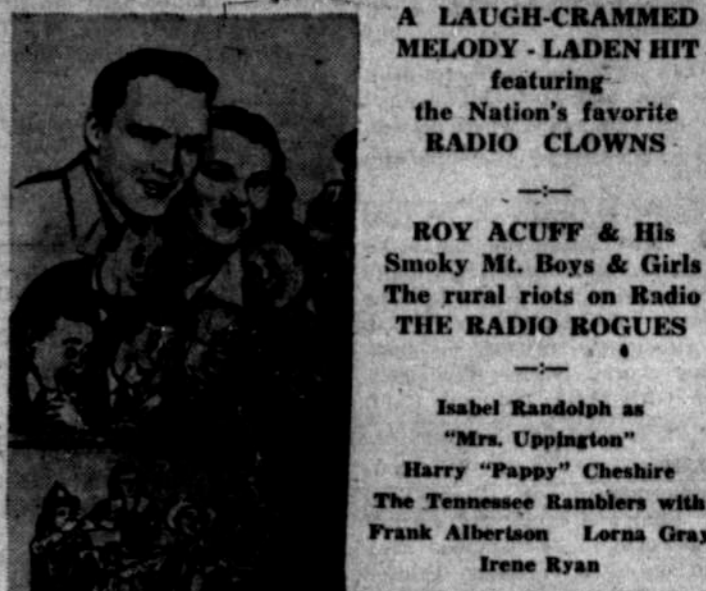
