After all were opened and everything so scattered I had no way of knowing who sent each gift, so guess I will just have to say 'thank ate wi you' to each one. Thanks, Mom, for sending me my hunting knife. You Navy. know they are precious out in the jungles fighting these Japs. I bave seen hunting knives sell for as high as sixty dollars and not very good


