Church To Observe Centennial Sunday

The Church of Christ will observe Centennial Sunday with appropriate services Sunday, March 19. This date is somewhere near the date of the founding of the first Christian Church in Oregon in 1846. The first church was founded on the banks of the Yamhill river somewhere near Amity with 13 members. Since that time the Christian Church has grown to be the second largest religious body in Oregon with 27,000 members and 144 churches.

During the services Sunday morning the Centennial Evangelist A. C. Bates will speak on the theme, "The Might of the Mite," and the members of the local congregation that have served the longest will be recognized. This service is a part of the Centennial program which will be consummated at Turner in 1946 when all the Christian churches in Oregon will have a great Centennial observance. A feature of the morning service will be the chalk drawing of the Centennial Poster by Mrs. Nina Nosler. Evangelist Bates will bring to a conclusion the three weeks special meetings Sunday night with the message, "Spiritual Rationing." Everyone is urged to attend these services.

Noted Educator Decries Government Management

Postwar America must decide whether to move toward prosperity under private management or "toward chaos under government management," Dr. George S. Benson, economist and president of Harding College, Searcy, Ark., said in a recent speech.

Postwar production would be 50 per cent greater through private enterprise and "50 per cent less through government management," the educator said.

Remarking that private enterprise "was not without weakness," Dr. Benson urged education through high schools to teach what private enterprise means to the American way of living.
