Mrs. Ira Baumgartner sends in the following extracts from a letter, written Feb. 29, by her son, Robert H., who was injured in action in the Pacific and is now in the Naval Hospital at Corona, Calif.:

Today for the first time I was able to get a shoe on my bum foot. Had to split the shoe over my instep. It hurt quite a bit but I wore it anyhow all afternoon.

It may be quite a while before I can come home. My ankle is still stiff and sore. I can't walk without crutches yet but my wound is almost healed. Has a good heavy scab on it and has filled out so it is not sunk in any more.

Mr. and Mrs. Seelye have received a letter from their son, Pvt. Robert Seelye, that he is now "somewhere in Australia," having evidently arrived there about March 1. He says:

"We are living in tents, but so does everyone in 'somewhere in Australia.'" The only trouble with the girls here is that I can hardly understand them when they talk.

"They gave us two passes, so whenever we aren't working, we are on our own. As you know, this is the first permanent pass I've had, so it is quite a shock. In over a year in the army, I've had only three week-end passes. And now this: I'd sure seem unappreciative if I didn't like this place. We'll be paid in Aussie dough here, so I'll never know if I've been cheated, or anything. It seems like the Aussies do everything backward. The street cars are trams, the beer hall are hotels, pennies are pence and they break them down to half pence. They drive on the wrong side and some of the names they have for towns! I still look the wrong way for the traffic when I cross a street but I'm learning fast. The little midget autos they use wouldn't hurt you anyway. When this is over I'll come back to the States, go to cross a street, and get a hind end full of bumper."

Their oldest son, Howard Seelye, Jr., SM 3/c in the Coast Guard, is stationed temporarily at Norfolk, Va., but hopes to be in Coquille soon on leave, before going back to sea.

The prosecutor established the fact that he, Mortimer Brown, had on a previous trip attempted to rustle a cow and, in trying to capture it, had suffered black eyes and other bodily injury, thus causing mental disturbances which could lead him into similar acts.

The defense did not enter a plea of insanity but stayed with their original plea of not guilty.

With the aid of 13 large oranges, presented to the judge and jury during his rebuttal, the prosecution managed to get a verdict of guilty as charged from the jury, with a recommendation that both he and the plaintiff be tried at next camp, one for bribing and the other for cruelty to dumb animals.
