Returned Missionary From China To Be At Assembly Of God Church Next Week

Of interest to the public will be the arrival of Rev. H. A. Park, missionary from China, repatriated abroad the M. S. Gripsholm on its first exchange. This missionary spent 12 years in China, the last five in Hong Kong where they were during the siege by the Japanese. He was interned in the much written about Kowloon Hotel and later transferred to the Stanley Internment Camp where he lost 75 pounds in weight. Beginning Tuesday evening, April 13, at the Assembly of God Church, Rev. H. A. Park will be speaking nightly except Saturday evening. He will be showing stereopticon views on Chinese life, religion, customs and a few pictures taken by the Japanese of the internment camp. Since returning to the United States Mr. Park has been studying the Mandarin dialect in a California University and he plans to return to China as soon as the State Department grants his passport.

Marines At Tarawa Shown In Film At Roxy Thur. to Sat.

Fighting that cost the United States Marines a life for every square yard of ground gained, the bloodiest casualty list in American military history, is shown in "With The Marines At Tarawa," which comes to the Roxy Theatre, Thursday, Friday at Saturday. In storming the fortified island of Betio, 2 1/2 miles long and 500 yards wide in the Tarawa formation, the Marines suffered fewer than 1,000 killed and 2,500 wounded, before achieving a brilliant and total victory by wiping out the 4000 Jap defenders of this Tarawa atoll strong point.

Marine Combat Photographers went ashore with the landing parties and filmed the action on the firing line, right up to the loopholes of the massive, concrete Japanese blockhouses. They made this cinema record of actual war, in technicolor. It cost two of them their lives to get these two reels of heroism and destruction. The photographers carried pistols and knives as well as their cameras and fought while filming.
