Ralph Moore Talks To Woman's Club

(Continued from Page One) wherein lies a pitfall for the state with a rush of private schools which might spring up ready to catch the "gravy." Also Mr. Moore's belief is that the state should know first what action the government will take.

The bill which changes the language of the term "insane" to mentally diseased should be passed.

The Sales Tax bill was termed a good bill as it gets rid of objectionable features of other bills. It is a companion to the School Bill and is supposed to raise twenty-five million dollars. It contains a list of exemptions, mostly items of food and doesn't attack the needs of the poor. Mr. Moore thinks the timing for the bill would be better in 1947, but adds it is the best bill put up so far.

Mrs. George Taylor, chairman of Legislation, introduced the speaker and was in charge of the program. An impressive representative of the four great allies—United States, England, Russia and China—was carried out by Mrs. Tom Stevens, Mrs. Wm. Candlin, who was born in England, Mrs. Maria Hale, born in China, but whose parents are Russian and Polish, and Mildred McCarthy taking the place of Madam Why, born in China.

The American Creed was given by Mrs. Stevens, the Atlantic Charter read by Mrs. Candlin. A characterization of the Russian people with their love of music and the reading in Russian of their national anthem was Mrs. Hale's contribution. Also she spoke of their love for gypsy music and she played a beautiful record of her favorite Russian gypsy number. She was striking in Gypsy costume. A translation of the Russian anthem was sung by Mrs. Chas. Stauff, accompanied by Miss Inez Rover.

Substituting for Madam Why, of Marshfield, Mildred McCarthy, in Chinese costume, was perfect in her part representing China. A chorus of trained voices sang in English the Chinese national anthem, which was received with every appreciation. Those in the chorus were Mesdames Chas. Stauff, George Johnson, G. W. Tyrrell, R. E. Boober, Birdie Skeels and Miss Aileen Wilson. Miss Inez Rover was the accompanist and exhibited skill in her profession through taking off the music for the Russian anthem from the Christian Science Monitor. The difficulty was from indistinct type which even the magnifying glass did not solve. Mrs. Stauff sang the anthem with much feeling and sweetness.

Announcements were made by the president, Mrs. O. C. Sanford, regarding the May Festival which will be held again this year as usual in the Community Building. Efforts are being made to get the best music available and nothing will be spared to make this celebration as attractive as in other years.

Stage decorations included the flags of America, Russia, China and England. The floral centerpiece on the tea table was in red, white and blue, topped with a group of beautiful silk flags. Mrs. Candlin and Mrs. Hale presided at the tea table. Mrs. George Chaney was in charge of the tea, the committee being Mesdames A. B. Collier, L. H. Hazard, F. L. Houston, John Purkey Lloyd Clayer, T. A. Horn, C. G. Coveau, N. Chowning.
