Chas. Sprague A Very Able Man

Charles A. Sprague seeks the republican nomination to the United States Senate for the seat held by the late Charles L. McNary, in the May primaries.

In addition to the rapid strides ahead made in defense, and labor conditions during Charles A. Sprague's administration as governor, is the forestry program developed at that time. Oregon is now the most advanced state in forestry conservation and fire protection—safeguarding the state's biggest industrial payroll.

Charles A. Sprague gave the state distinguished service as its chief executive, and has also served in many other capacities. He owns and operates the "Salem Statesman," a daily whose policy has been kept on a consistently high level. He is trusted

of Willamette University and of Lewis and Clark College. He is an active member of the Salem Chamber of Commerce.

In his many roles of public servant Charles A. Sprague has devoted his entire time and sincere efforts towards serving his state to the best of his ability.
