

### Class Play Was Well Presented

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Lydia (Glenda Richardson) elopes with Mr. Wickham, the villain of the play.

Darcy's attempt to detach Bingley from Jane, the Bennet's gentle daughter, strengthens Elizabeth's distaste for Darcy.

The climax is reached when Darcy, who all along has been falling in love with Elizabeth, proposes to her and she spurns him. Here Winifred Van Fleet had her chance and proved her ability at dramatics. Later when she discovers why he interfered in the match between Jane and Bingley she learns that but for Darcy who patched up the marriage between Lydia (Glenda Richardson) and Wickham, a lasting disgrace would have fallen upon the entire Bennet household.

Elizabeth and Darcy come to understand each other and pride and prejudice vanish with logical conclusion.

Much talent was exhibited by individual members of the cast, some parts permitting greater opportunities than others. Barbara Barrows, taking the part of Mary, the bookish daughter, was especially characteristic. Jeanne Boyle was well chosen for the part of Jane, the gentle daughter, seeming naturally to have everything to contribute to her part. The combat of wits between Elizabeth and Darcy were delightfully handled by Jim Bunch and Winifred Van Fleet. All the sister characters were differentiated and each portrayed with skill the type of girl the plot required.

The play included seven parts for boys and these, like the parts for

girls, were well chosen and well taken.

Miss Luelle Chapin was given a curtain call to accept flowers and a gift from the cast and in her few words of acceptance stated to the audience that "the class had tried something different this year, and she hoped it would be liked."

The presentation individually and as a whole was finished. The creation of costumes and make-up was true to the period depicted when Jane Austen wrote her novel in 1796 at the age of twenty-two.
