#### Paratrooper George Wilson Is Home

George Wilson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Wilson who have been residing in Coquille for the past several months, arrived home last Thursday from Camp Mackall, North Carolina, and will leave on Friday this week to return to that camp. George is a paratrooper and anticipates that this is his last furlough before being sent overseas. He was a Coquille High graduate in 1936 at the time the Wilson family was living on Fairview mountain.

Extracts from an interesting letter which he wrote his parents, but which did not arrive until after he did, are presented below:

I did not have time to write my wife during the two weeks we were at the Camp Davis Anti-Aircraft School for Machine Gunners. We would get up at five a. m., load ammunition until noon, fire in the afternoon and evenings until midnight, to learn tracer-control. It was mighty interesting but I sure lost a lot of sleep.

Have just gotten out of the field from a ten-day problem, tactical of course, for an Airplane Command test, and we worked from daylight till dark. They cut the problem short two days so as to bring us in for two weeks processing for overseas duty, which means I will have a furlough and when I get back it will be the wide Pacific for me from what I gather. It looks like I may see a few yellow bellies sooner than I had planned, but that's fine if it will help get this mess over any sooner.

Things are getting warm and they are really rushing us around. They just got through taking away all my extra equipment and I've been standing inspection for two days. Have taken all my "shots" and had the medical examination. The saying is "when you travel light you're going to fight."

Our outfit has a small bear which we got at Camp Davis for a mascot. He was sitting on my bed, in the middle of my full field display when the colonel came in today for inspection and did I catch—? I had to drag the bear out by the neck and then he came in, got up on the pool table and grinned at us.

I made expert rifleman in practice, with one of the highest scores in the battalion, outscoring the officers by quite a bit.

I made a jump last week and we rode all over the state before jumping. I really enjoyed it.

Private George T. Folsom, of Coquille, has been selected to attend the Enlisted Communication course of the Field Artillery School at Fort Sill, Okla. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bert Folsom, Coquille.
