In the 4/5 mile relay, Linn, Sutphin, Moore, Devent won first place for Myrtle Point in 2 minutes, 59 4/5 seconds, and Wise, Bargelt, Butler and Barker won first for that school in the 2/5 mile relay in 1 minute, 19 8/10 seconds.

Myrtle Point also won four of the six field events. In the high jump relay, Dever, Belloni and Bargelt totalled 15 ft., 8 in. Belloni and Dever tied for high at 5 ft., 3 in. Dever, with 113 ft. 10 in. was high in the discus relay, he and Wise and Perkins totalling 315 ft. 8 in. Dever was also high in the broad jump relay, at 19 ft. 10 1/2 in., Devent and Sutphin bringing the M. P. total up to 55 ft. 3 in.

Alborn of Coquille was high in the javelin relay with a toss of 158 ft., 9 in., but Barker, Niel and Dever won the combined toss with a total of 430 ft. 8 in. Coquille's total for second place in this event was 424 ft. 6 in., and Marshfield's 398 ft. 7 in. In the discus relay Marshfield was second with 293 ft. 3 in., and Coquille, third, with 290 ft. 11 in.

In the broad jump relay, Coquille's second place score was 52 ft. 5 in., and Marshfield, third, totalled 50 ft. 10 1/2 in. C. H. S. scored 16 points, Marshfield 20 and Myrtle Point 18 in track events. In field events Myrtle Point totalled 21, Coquille 15 and Marshfield 9.
