## Ben Lawrence, Indiana Publisher, Quits The Game

Ben F. Lawrence, brother of Kenneth Lawrence of Coquille, and who began his newspaper life in Coquille more than 40 years ago by publishing The Bulletin, one of the predecessors of The Sentinel, is to retire from the active management and editorship of the Indianapolis Star, a position which he had held for 25 years. He had been with the Star for 35 years and when John C. Shaffer, the owner of several papers in Indiana, recently died, Mr. Lawrence was made one of the two trustees of the Shaffer estate.

Last week the trustees sold the Indianapolis Star and the Muncie Star to E. C. Pulliam who already owned several Indiana papers. The new owner wanted Mr. Lawrence to retain his position but the latter wishes to retire; however he did consent to remain for a time in an advisory capacity. Mr. Pulliam gives credit, in an issue of the Star, to Mr. Lawrence's well-known ability as a publisher in the following words: "We are deeply disappointed that Mr. Lawrence feels he should retire. He is one of the really great newspaper publishers of America. He has been my personal friend for 25 years and I would have been most happy had he felt inclined to continue as publisher of The Star indefinitely. There will be no other changes in the staff or the personnel of either The Indianapolis Star or The Muncie Star."
