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Ever hear of "Kabobs"?

Kabobs (also known as Shish Kebab, and En Brochettes): Let 2-inch squares of lamb soak for half-hour or longer in a barbecue-type sauce containing oil, vinegar and garlic. String squares of lamb on skewer alternately with thick slices of tomato, onion and orange. Broil for 10 to 15 minutes, turning once.

Barbecued Breast of Lamb: Plan for 1/4 lb. of lamb per person. Leave whole, or cut into pieces for serving. Place in single layer in drip pan; sprinkle with salt and pepper (do not add water and do not cover). Roast in moderately hot oven (400° F.) about 1 hour or until well browned and meat is done, turning occasionally.
