 The school districts which are embraced in the boundary of zone 4 are: New Lake, Laurel Lake, Two Mile, Bear Creek, Floras Creek, Four Mile, Prosper, Upper Two Mile, Seaside, Fat Elk, Cunningham, Coaledo, Fairview, Riverside, Roy, Valley View, portion of Riverfront district which was formerly Leneve, and a small portion of the Norway district lying in the Non High School territory.
