

Two Food Spoilage Clinics To Be Held

To assist in the elimination of food waste from food spoilage in home canned products, the County Nutrition Committee, under the direction of Mrs. Dorothy Bishop Dunn, county home demonstration agent, will sponsor two district food spoilage clinics in the county early in June. The tentative dates are: Coquille, June 9 and Marshfield, June 13. Any organization or community which desires to have available at a moments notice answers to their food preservation problems is invited to appoint two representatives to attend one of these meetings. These women will be trained in the latest food preservation methods as recommended by Oregon State College and the United States Department of Agriculture and will be supplied with Federal and State bulletins for distribution to women in their organization or com-

munity who request assistance. Organizations desiring to send representatives are asked to send the names of those appointed to the Home Demonstration Agent by June.

Two new 1944 pressure cookers have just arrived at the office of the Home Demonstration Agent and will be available for loan purposes to 4-H Clubs, homemakers who plan to do their own canning in their homes, or to groups of women who want to can surplus produce for school lunches. This brings the total to four pressure cookers and one tin can sealer available from the county office for loan purposes. There is no charge for this service, the only requirement being that the equipment be returned promptly in good condition. The borrower will pay the transportation charges, if any.

Persons desiring to have their pressure gauge and safety valve checked are asked to send them to the Home Demonstration Agent not later than May 20. Remove the gauge or safety valve with a wrench, attach name and address with tape to each instrument, wrap carefully, and include 50 cents per gauge, 25 cents per safety valve, and 25 cents additional if a new glass is needed on the gauge. If the dial face is rusty, the gauge is probably beyond repair, in which case, a new one, the cost of which is about \$1.50, should be ordered directly from the manufacturer.

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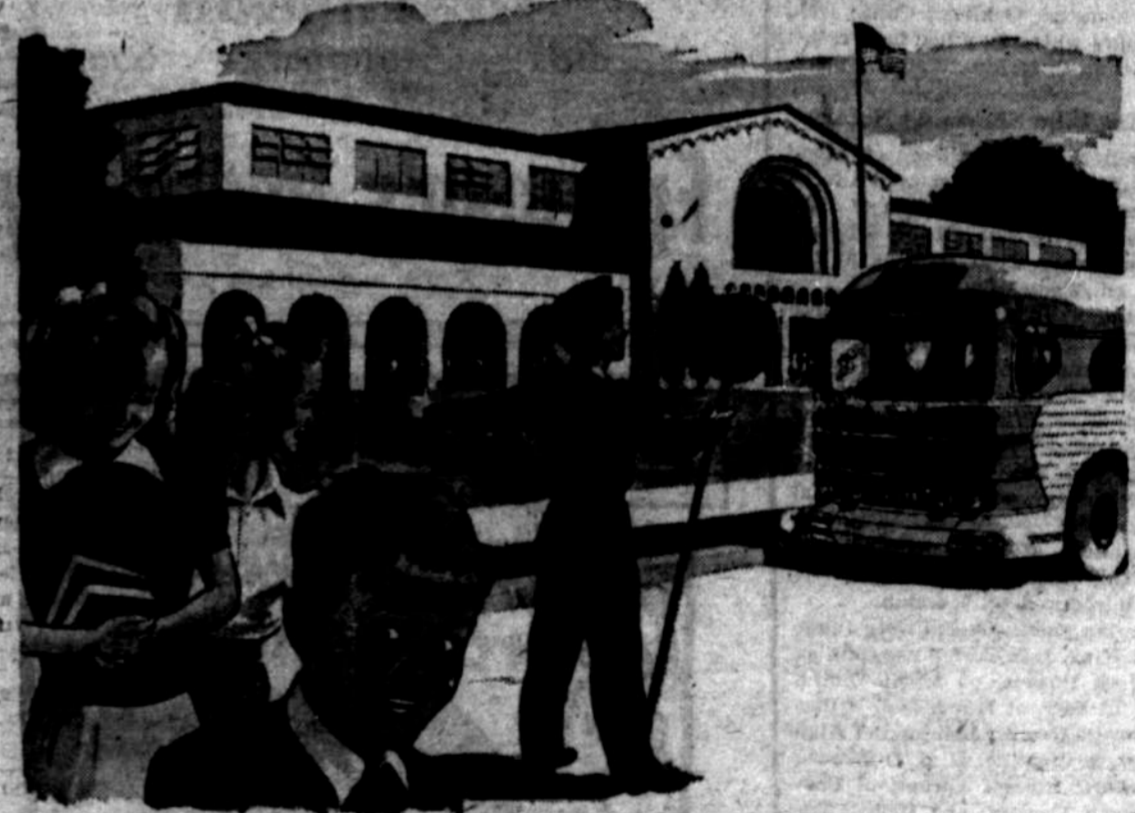
