Am still enjoying good health and working hard seven days a week. The work has slackened off though, which is a relief.

I do appreciate receiving letters from old friends and will tell all the folks "hello" for me!

I'm sorry I can't write them all but some day this thing will be over and I can be home to see them personally. Yes, I receive the Coquille Sentinel quite regularly.

"Everything is quite fine. In fact, to date the experiences have been most interesting. The beauty of the countryside I have seen has been thrilling, indeed. The rural areas, as we might call them, simply seem to be nothing but garden and green. The village homes are surrounded by all colors and shades in flowers and shrubs. As I told Bill, a Hollywood technicolor production can't equal the scene.

"Everett and I are not in contact up to date, though I have written to him. Later we may get together. You can realize how good it will be if we do. Sincerely, Mark."

Bronze Star Medal Awarded Sgt. Irwin E. Henagin

Sergeant Irwin E. Henagin, Fairview route, Coquille, of the U. S. Army Corps of Military Police, has been awarded the Bronze Star Medal by Maj. Gen. Oscar W. Griswold, Allied Commander at Bougainville, by direction of the President, for meritorious service as a chief mechanic for a Military Police Company during combat operations in New Georgia and Bougainville, Aug. 21, 1943, to April 19 of this year.

The award reads: "Sergeant Henagin through his resourcefulness, initiative, ability to improvise, and devotion to duty, kept the vehicles of his organization in constant repair at a time when they were vitally necessary in the control of traffic during combat operations."

Julia gives tasty ways to use bacon

BACON! What a joy to have plenty of it available! And you know, bacon has many fine uses for lunch and dinner, in addition to time-honored "bacon or breakfast." Here are some suggestions which I hope you'll try:

BACON CORNMEAL MUFFINS
1 1/2 cups enriched 2 tbsps. sugar flour, sifted 2 eggs, well beaten 1 cup yellow cornmeal 1 cup milk 1 tsp. baking powder 1/4 cup melted bacon fat 3/4 tsp. salt 8 slices cooked bacon, chopped

Sift and mix all dry ingredients together. Combine beaten eggs, milk and melted bacon fat, add to dry ingredients with chopped cooked bacon, stirring only enough to dampen flour. Fill greased muffin pans two-thirds full and bake in moderately hot oven (425° F.) about 20 minutes. Make 8 muffins.

LIMA BEAN & BACON CASSEROLE
2 cups lima beans 1 cup tomatoes (dry) 1/2 large onion Salt and pepper 8 slices bacon

Soak lima beans, then simmer until tender. Season with salt, pepper, add tomatoes and finely chopped onion and place in a 2 qt. casserole. Add strips of bacon over the top and bake in moderate oven (350° F.) for 30 minutes. Serves 5 to 6.
