Mr. Cross will succeed Ed Detleson who has since September 29, 1933 served faithfully as a member of the Non-High School Board. Mr. Detleson refused to let his name be entered as a candidate for a board member again.

The Non-High School Law permits petitions to be filed with the office of the county school superintendent not later than 15 days before the annual school meeting. Therefore, this is the only name which will appear on the ballot for a director in Zone 4.

Chairmen and Clerks in Zone 4 are receiving, through the secretary of the Non-High School Board, complete instructions for an election which will be carried on at the close of the regular school meeting in each school district within the zone.
