Fritz Kunz and DeWayne Mitchell, two of last month's high school graduates, left Sunday evening for Bozeman, Mont. They had enlisted in the Army and both being under 18 years of age, they are sent to the Montana State College for six months of schooling.

Mr. and Mrs. John E. Stone, of Johnson Mill, this week received a letter from their son, Boyd, who left San Francisco for somewhere in the South Pacific after being in the Navy for more than a year. It was their first letter from him in several weeks and it is printed here for the benefit of the many friends Boyd has in this section:

"Somewhere in N. Guinea," Dear Mom and Dad: I finally got here after so long a time. I was sure glad when I got off the ship and away from crowded conditions but now I don't know but what I was better off. It's not so bad, tho. We have good tents to stay in and that's more than some guys have got.

We will start using Australian money while we're over here so I'll have to learn what it's all about. They are changing our money for us today.

There are a lot of natives running around here. I don't know if they are pygmies or not but they aren't any bigger. They are called "fuzzy-wuzzies" here. Their hair looks like a reddish brown Hallowe'en wig. They're real friendly. They will salute everybody that comes along with either hand or both and it doesn't matter if you laugh at them because they think you're smiling and will smile right back. Their teeth are black from chewing on a root that grows here.

I hope everybody is okay at home. I haven't heard from anybody for over a month now but I expect it to catch me soon. So long for now. Boyd.

not object to the 24-hour parking on Third street, alongside his home, but that when cars or trucks are parked on the highway in front of his home all day long so that he cannot drive up to his own doorway, he thought it time to make a protest.

Councilman Geo. Burr was appointed chairman of the city's clean-up week committee and asked to name the other committee members.

Restaurant licenses were granted Winifred Blair for the White Spot on Front street and to Frances Teaney for the Eat-Mor Shoppe on First street, after the fire chief had inspected and approved the conditions around the kitchen in each.

The application of Chas. L. Ekins to the State Liquor Commission for a Class B retail beer license was approved by the council.

Upon the recommendation of Chief Creager, the temporary appointment of Wm. Keller on the police force was confirmed.

Fire Chief Craig Perrott told the council that the fire department members would assist on the trucks which will collect rubbish and trash from parking strips during Clean-up Week, June 18-23.

Upon the recommendation of Engineer Gearhart it was ordered that a second railing be installed on the 85-foot pedestrian bridge across the low spot on Collier street, near Fourth.

A call for bids for 300 feet of specially covered 1 1/2 inch hose for the street department was ordered.

The council also voted to approve 11

the Fire Department's request for new booster hose, two nozzles, pump-reducers and other equipment needed to make the fire-fighting apparatus more efficient, and to pay the \$80 expenses of sending the chief to the annual firemen's convention. The total of the items estimated at about \$300 and that expenditure will not overrun the budget for the department.

When the council adjourned at 10:30 it was until next Monday evening when a special session will be held to pass on the 1944-45 budget estimates as prepared by the budget committee. The budget will appear in next week's Sentinel.

### County Fair Check For \$1,231 Comes From Salem

County Treasurer Stauff has received a check from the state for \$1,231.10 for the Coos-Curry County Fair. This fund was raised by the 1/20th mill state tax on property in the two counties. In counties which do not have county fairs, products or stock shows which come under the operation of the law, the statutes prescribe that the money raised from that levy shall be used on roads.
