"Serve with the Navy Medical Corps," urges Pacific Greyhound Lines in their current advertisement released in more than five hundred western newspapers. This is another advertisement in Pacific Greyhound's series in cooperation with the recruiting program of the armed forces, chiefly aimed at getting women to enlist in the various auxiliaries. Others were Seabees, Marines, Waves, and Wacs.

This latest advertisement features both the Navy Nurse Corps, open to trained nurses, and the Waves Hospital Corps which urgently needs other women to serve in the naval hospitals, clerical capacities, and as helpers in the wards, laboratories and pharmacies. Much of this work is now being done by male hospital corpsmen, and women can release these men for duty on the fighting fronts.

### Coos County Quota Nearly Two Million

Coos county's quota for the 5th war loan will be the highest ever established. It has been announced by Clarence Coe, Coos county war finance committee chairman, who was so advised by E. C. Sammons, state chairman, Oregon war finance committee.

The county's quota for Series E bonds was set at \$720,000, sales to individuals (all series), \$1,155,000, corporations, \$823,000.

The state's \$125 million quota—the cost of America's part in the war for twelve hours—is the largest quota allotted to Oregon since the beginning of the war financing program. Originally set at \$123 million, war bond leaders requested Ted Gamble, former executive manager of the Oregon war finance committee and national director of the war finance division, to raise the quota two million so that Oregon could pay for at least 12 hours war against the Axis.

### War Bonds Cannot Go Below Par This Time

Most farmers still remember the "after war" depression of the 1920's when Liberty bonds sold for 82 cents on the dollar. Liberty bonds at that time were negotiable securities. The Government redeemed them only at maturity. In the meantime, when farmers needed cash to tide them over, they were forced to sell Liberty bonds for whatever price the buyer was willing to pay. Later these same bonds went above par, but for a time after World War I they could be sold only at a loss.

Farmers learned that negotiable bonds were not safe investments for money intended for financial reserves. Negotiable bonds too often sell below par, all too often when cash is most needed.

Profiting from this experience, the Treasury has made war bonds "depression proof." E, F, and G series are issued in registered form only. Printed on every bond is a table of redemption values—a part of the bond contract itself. Owners of these bonds know now what their cash-in values will be at any future period. They know that they can depend on "depression proof" war bonds to set up a dependable post war reserve for repair of buildings, replacement of obsolete machinery, equipment for post war home needs, and taxes. "Depression proof" war bonds are worth as much in depression as during boom times—actually more, for dollars buy more during depression.

### Work Being Stepped Up On Curry County Airport

Work of clearing for the Curry county airport near Sixes is being stepped up, a crew of 20 men now being employed, according to Sam Lehman, manager of the U.S. employment service, Marshfield, who is supplying laborers for the project. An additional 20 men will be employed within the next two weeks if weather permits burning by that time.

A dozen bulldozers and carry-alls are included in the big machinery on the ground to start the grading. —Western World.

### Annual Meeting of The First Church of Christ, Scientist

While holding military might essential to the victory of allied nations over the anti-Christ claims of injustice and intolerance, The Christian Science Board of Directors told the annual meeting of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Massachusetts, Monday this week, that freedom is essentially a spiritual gift "to be realized only through spiritual understanding and attainment."

The Directors' statement highlighted reports to the third annual meeting of The Mother Church held under wartime conditions which cited increasing evidence of church growth and activity, and unprecedented demands for the works of Mary Baker Eddy and The Christian Science Monitor. Sales of Mrs. Eddy's works were said to have risen to twice the volume of the last pre-war year, indicating the increasing desire for spiritual progress in the wartime emergency.

Despite the emergency rationing of paper and other wartime restrictions, the Trustees of The Christian Science Publishing Society revealed the largest circulation ever attained by the leading Christian Science periodicals, and Bible sales were twice those of 1942. This progress was made possible under paper allotments by reducing the basic weight of paper with no reduction in reading matter, ex-

cepting that of The Christian Science Monitor.
