

**New Federal Auto Stamps Must Be Affixed By July 1**

J. W. Maloney, Collector of Internal Revenue, Portland, announces that the Federal auto use tax stamps in the denomination of \$5 would be placed on sale in all post offices in the State of Oregon and in his office at Portland, on Saturday, June 10, 1944. The stamp will evidence payment of the tax for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1944, and must be purchased on or before that date. The stamps will be serially numbered, will be gummed on the face, and will have provision on the back for entry of the make, model, serial number, and state license number of the motor vehicle. The use on the public highway of an automobile, truck, motorcycle, or bus makes it subject to the tax. The tax stamp is transferable with the motor vehicle. If the vehicle is in storage or out of use in July, it will become subject to tax as of the month in which it is placed in use on the public highway. Collector Maloney stated that, to guard against loss or theft, it was ad-

visible to dampen the windshield rather than the adhesive side of the stamp when affixing the stamp. Another effective method is to brush clear varnish over the stamp after it has been affixed.

All motor vehicle owners are cautioned that the law regarding the purchase of the Federal motor vehicle use tax stamp has not been changed or repealed, and failure to purchase and display the new tax stamp on vehicles used on the public highway on or after July 1, 1944, will subject the violators to severe penalties imposed by law.

**Fascinating Jobs For The WAVES**

Naval air stations now are absorbing the largest percentage of new WAVES to handle a hundred or more fascinating and interesting jobs formerly considered to be the exclusive activity of navy men, announces Chief Specialist Paul H. Connet, of the Marshfield U. S. Navy recruiting station, which handles WAVES applications in this area.

Most of the 47,000 WAVES who will be enlisted in 1944 will be assigned to one of the navy's many air stations, joining thousands of WAVES already on active duty at these centers. Success of naval fliers in the coming grand offensive in the Pacific will be due in a large part to the work of these trim and efficient WAVES.

WAVES gunnery instructors teach them how to shoot and how to properly lead a Jap zero. Skilled WAVE navigation experts teach them how to find their way back to the bases in a intensive course in celestial navigation training.

WAVES teach naval fliers how to fly by instrument as link trainer instructors. They operate the low pressure chambers which give fliers the first-hand experience in operating in high altitudes with sudden changes of altitude.

WAVE control tower operators direct the traffic on large airports, insuring the safety of intensive training operations. Trim WAVES as aviation machinist's mates help keep the motors in airplanes operating at full efficiency. WAVES serving as metalsmiths maintain equipment.

Among the scores of other jobs which WAVES are handling at naval air stations are: aerographers who collect and distribute vital weather information, yeomen who keep records on fliers' progress through these training centers, storekeepers who keep the station's supplies in order, pharmacist's mates who help maintain the health of fliers, telegraphers, teletype operators and radio equipment operators who help maintain the navy's fast communications system.

WAVES are selected for these fascinating jobs in a series of aptitude tests at the WAVES indoctrination school at Hunter college. These tests show the aptitude of the WAVE enlistee for advanced training which prepares her to serve at a naval air station. Many young women who do not know their true abilities discover talents through these tests.

With most of the WAVES being assigned to naval air stations, young women are assured of a good opportunity of getting one of these jobs, provided they are qualified and have the necessary aptitude. Other WAVE jobs at other stations are equally as interesting and varied.

WAVE requirements are few: an applicant must be a U. S. citizen, have no children under 18 years, be between 20 and 36 years and have two years of high school or its equivalent.

Young women interested in the WAVES in this area should make application in person or by letter to the Marshfield navy recruiting station. If found acceptable they will be taken to Portland for enlistment with all expenses paid.
