

NOTICE OF CITY BUDGET

Japan Agrees To The Purchase \$25,000 Worth of Supplies Monthly For U. S. War Prisoners
 Expansion of the work of War Prisoners' Aid, Y. M. C. A., a participating service of the National War Fund, may be expected as the result of the State Department announcement that Japan has agreed to the purchase of \$25,000 worth of relief supplies a month for war prisoners and civilian internees in the Philippines, according to advices received by Charles A. Sprague, president of the Oregon War Chest.

The United States Government has made available the funds to purchase the \$25,000 worth of supplies each month, but administration will be carried on by neutral representatives working for War Prisoners' Aid, Y. M. C. A., funds for which are allocated from contributions to each county War Chest in the state through the Oregon War Chest. The work of locating supplies, purchasing, packing and distribution will be undertaken by War Prisoners' Aid, in cooperation with other neutral organizations.

The State Department in its announcement of this agreement for limited relief for war prisoners held by the Japanese stated that "The United States Government is continuing to press the Japanese Government to grant full reciprocity in this respect."
 In the event that wider opportunities for work with war prisoners is afforded by the Japanese Government, War Prisoners' Aid is prepared to expand its program to meet the needs, which authorities state are far beyond the limited amount of supplies thus far agreed to by the Japanese Government.

Announcement has been made in London that the British and United States Governments have agreed upon a method for shipping supplies for war prisoners in Japan, and it is expected that as soon as opportunity is afforded by the Japanese Government for distribution that the work for War Prisoners Aid will be widely expanded.
 Neutral representatives of War Prisoners' Aid, Y. M. C. A., have been working in behalf of the war prisoners held by the Japanese since the outbreak of the war in the Pacific.

ARGENTINA IS A POOR SOUTH AMERICAN NEIGHBOR
 The Argentine Government is as poor a neighbor to the United States as Ireland is to England, perhaps even worse, because the Irish Government merely leans over backwards in neutrality while Argentina has continued to play ball on the back lot, and under cover, with the Axis.
 Washington has had patience in straightening out many minor disturbances in relations with Argentina. Within the past few days the Argentine Government inserted advertisements in Washington newspapers and in other places asking for bids to erect a synthetic rubber plant in Argentina. Our State Department refused to permit United States concerns to sell any synthetic rubber secret processes, and also forbade the export of any equipment, patents, or know-hows to Argentina.
 At the same time the Assistant Secretary of State Stettinius told a press conference that Latin-American exports were reaching Germany through Spain. Argentina now gets rubber from Brazil and Bolivia and has no synthetic rubber plants.
 Those Argentinians are a stubborn lot and to all appearances they are determined to set up a part of the Western Hemisphere to be run according to their orders. That can't be permitted!
