

Gen. Ike's Letter To Invasion Force

C. G. (Hode) Campbell has received from his son, Ralph, who is stationed with the U. S. armed forces in England, the copy of the letter Ralph received, as did also the others of the invasion forces, which had been signed by Gen. Dwight Eisenhower before D day on June 6. The letter reads:

Soldiers, Sailors and Airmen of the Allied Expeditionary Force!

You are about to embark upon the Great Crusade, toward which we have striven these many months. The eyes of the world are upon you. The hopes and prayers of liberty-loving people everywhere march with you. In company with our brave Allies and brothers-in-arms on other Fronts, you will bring about the destruction of the German war machine, the elimination of Nazi tyranny over the oppressed peoples of Europe, and security for ourselves in a free world.

Your task will not be an easy one. Your enemy is well trained, well equipped and battle-hardened. He will fight savagely.

But this is the year 1944! Much has happened since the Nazi triumphs of 1940-41. The United Nations have inflicted upon the Germans great defeats in open battle, man-to-man. Our air offensive has seriously reduced their strength in the air and their capacity to wage war on the ground. Our Home Fronts have given us an overwhelming superiority in weapons and munitions of war, and placed at our disposal great reserves of trained fighting men. The tide has turned! The free men of the world are marching together to Victory!

I have full confidence in your courage, devotion to duty and skill in battle. We will accept nothing less than full Victory!

Good Luck! And let us all beseech the blessing of Almighty God upon this great and noble undertaking.

S. forces in France and that he is working long hours. Lorin's outfit was one of the first to hit the beachhead on the Normandy coast. In England he has been billeted near Merlin Brandon's outfit, and they saw one another often, but the letter was not with the first invasion force.

There is, of course, no advertising, but the paper is crammed full of world news, the war on all fronts, and it carries two comic strips.

J. E. Norton's Grandson Injured When Carrier Was Sunk

Mrs. C. Dayne Hudson stopped in Coquille Tuesday on her way from their ranch on Elk river to Portland, where they have resided for several years, and hopes to sell their home there soon and rejoin Mr. Hudson on the ranch. They left Coquille 20 years ago.

Mrs. Hudson said their son, C. Dayne, Jr., was on the Black Island flat top, which was sunk by the Nazis this month in the Mediterranean. He suffered a fractured hip and torn ligaments in his arm but has sent his parents word that he is otherwise all right and is recovering. He has a radio man second class rating and after he recovers is to be sent to Los Angeles for further instruction before being advanced to first class.

Their older son, Eugene, has been in the Army since soon after Pearl Harbor and has seen considerable action around New Guinea, where he has been stationed for the past year.

The two boys are grandsons of J. E. Norton, their mother being formerly Mildred Norton.

Sgt. Keith Holverstott's Picture in July 1 Collier's

He could not say anything about operations over there, nor just what he is doing, but he did say he was O. K. and expected to continue that way.

Lloyd Orville Wood, 26, husband of Mrs. Virginia H. Wood and son of Mayor and Mrs. O. L. Wood of Coquille, is receiving his initial indoctrination at the U. S. Naval Training Center, Great Lake, Ill., says a release from the training center.

His "boot" training consists of instruction in seamanship, military drill, and general naval procedure. During this period a series of aptitude tests will be taken by the recruit to determine whether he will be assigned to a Naval Service School or to immediate active duty at sea. His recruit training completed, the seaman will spend a period of leave at home.

Saving the Best in Fresh Vegetables

Few foods are better to eat—and better for us—than fresh vegetables. And yet, it's surprising how easy it is to lose much of their food and flavor value in cooking. Here are a few hints on how to SAVE those goodnesses:

FRESH vegetables (picked from your garden or bought at the store) should be washed quickly and stored immediately—vitamins and minerals are lost in soaking.

MOST vegetables should be cooked rapidly in a small amount of water (but use plenty of water for greens and strong-flavored vegetables, and cook them uncovered).

SALT for flavor should be added when the cooking is started—do not use soda in cooking fresh vegetables. KEEP vegetables whole for cooking, if you want to retain the best nutritional values.

SERVE them the minute they're cooked!



Vegetable Idea of the Week

- CURRIED PEAS
 - 2 cups fresh peas
 - 2 tbsps. butter or margarine
 - 1/2 tsp. salt
 - 2 tps. curry powder
 - 1/4 tsp. pepper
- Shell peas and cook, uncovered, in rapidly boiling salted water to cover until tender, about 10 to 15 minutes. Drain. Add butter or margarine, curry powder, salt and pepper. Serves 4 to 6.
