Riverton News

Riverton has held two annual school meetings the past week. The Grade school meeting was held on Monday, June 19. Mrs. Mary Libby was elected director to succeed Mrs. Clara Jeffery. Mrs. Lillian Hanly, who enjoys the reputation of being one of the best school clerks in Coos county, was re-elected for her ninth consecutive term.

The High school annual meeting was held Monday, June 26. David Philpott, of Randolph, was elected director to succeed Gerald Russell, also of Randolph.

Riverton is sending its high school students to Coquille this coming school year. As a result the community loses revenue heretofore received from Smith-Hughes and other sources when operating the school in its own building. An increased budget for each school is the consequence. The total estimated tax levies for this coming year for the grade school is \$10,092.00, as compared with \$4,488.00 for the past school year. Estimated tax levies for the coming year for the high school is \$9,397.00 as compared with \$5,660.50 for last year.

The increase in operating cost for the grade school this year is not so much due to the increase of teachers' salaries as it is to the increased burden the grade school must carry, without the high school to pay half the expenses, as has been the practice when holding both schools in Riverton's own building.

Teachers for the coming year will be Mrs. Lyla E. Mitchell, who is also principal; Mrs. Cuma Russell, Mrs. Ara Russell, and Mrs. Myrtle N. Kelly.
