Beat with rotary beater 2 to 3 minutes, or until batter is smooth. Pour batter into well greased shallow square cake pan (8x8x2), Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 30 minutes, or until done. Serve warm or cold, plain or

Cup Cekes, too, require surprisingly little time to prepare (summertime suggestions: serve them split and covered with crushed fresh fruit, or with frosting, or with powdered sugar). The recipe:

1 cup sugar 1 tsp. vanilla extract cups enriched 21/2 tops. baking
