Coquille Boy's Product Is Appreciated By Coast Guard

A large helmsman's wheel carved from hard wood by a coast guardman during a course at the Trade Extension and War Production Training branch of the Long Beach, Calif., vocational schools has just been pre-

sented to the Los Angeles Port of Embarkation.

This imposing work is the product of the craft of Howard J. Taylor, seaman first class, son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard M. Taylor of 241 N. Henry St., Coquille. The guardsman conceived the idea of making this wheel while working side by side at the John Dewey vocational schools with soldiers from LAPE wearing the colorful port of embarkation insignia—a helmsman's wheel on a brick red shield.

A shield now is being made at the Port to form the background for the wheel, and the two will be mounted in the center portion of an arched entrance to the Camp Ross (Figueroa) continent, an LAPE installation some two miles from the Port.

The three-foot wheel was made by Taylor during work in carpentry class. "We heard the Port needed a wheel and I needed the experience, so here's the wheel," he said at the presentation. A solid brass hub in the wheel was made by trainees at the Naval drydock.

Seaman Taylor has served with the Coast Guard 19 months, both at shore installations and on coast-wise vessels. Attached to the Coast Guard base at Wilmington, he is enrolled in the ship-carpentry class of the Dewey schools aboard a training ship.

How to make a "Jiffy" cake

THIS CAKE is the magic answer, when you're really in a hurry. Takes only a few minutes to make the batter, and a half-hour to bake. Here's the recipe:

JIFFY CAKE
1 1/2 cups enriched flour
2 1/2 tps. baking powder
1/4 tsp. salt
1 cup sugar
3/4 cup milk
1/2 cup softened shortening
1 egg
1 tsp. vanilla extract

Sift flour; measure; sift into large bowl with baking powder, salt, and sugar. Measure milk into cup; add shortening to fill. Dump milk, shortening, unbeaten egg, and flavoring into flour mixture. Beat with rotary beater 2 to 3 minutes, or until batter is smooth. Pour batter into well greased shallow square cake pan (8x8x2). Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 30 minutes, or until done. Serve warm or cold, plain or with sauce. Serves 8.

Cup Cakes, too, require surprisingly little time to prepare (summertime suggestions: serve them split and covered with crushed fresh fruit, or with frosting, or with powdered sugar). The recipe:

CUP CAKES
1 1/2 cups enriched flour
2 1/2 tps. baking powder
1/4 tsp. salt
1/2 cup shortening
1 cup sugar
1 tsp. vanilla extract
1 egg
3/4 cup milk

Sift flour; measure; mix and sift flour, baking powder and salt. Cream shortening until smooth; gradually add sugar, creaming until fluffy; beat in vanilla and egg. Add flour alternately with milk, beating until smooth after each addition. Turn into greased muffin pans and bake in moderate oven (375° F.) about 25 minutes. Makes 18 cakes.
