entrenchments and Japs skyward. The advance was rapid. "The Japs are tired. They haven't much fight left," Lt. Seeley said. On the beach to our left, three Japs put grenades to their heads and pulled the pins when they saw marines pop through the brush. The Japs hadn't fired a shot.

We pushed on some 300 yards and halted. Our scouts had found a group of about 200 Jap civilians and soldiers, many of them wounded, just ahead.

"We'll give them a chance to surrender," the Oregon Leatherneck said, and motioned for his Japanese interpreter to make contact.

We waited. Even on a push, every lull in the advance found tired marines stretching out for a quick "20 winks." These men had battled through Garapan, hiked to this northern end of the island over steep, twisting mountain roads to begin the drive to the sea. This was the third day of gruelling work and fight. They were tired.

Lt. Seeley contacted the battalion commander, reporting the pocket of Japs ahead of us and their condition. The radio brought the word to stop and retire. Organized resistance on the island was over. The Japs would surrender.

Taut nerves relaxed. You could feel the tenseness lessen. The lieutenant's smile brightened his be-grimed, bearded face.

"Maybe we'll sleep tonight," he said.

Squatted low in the canefield furrows, sitting on coral rock, the company's warriors lighted cigarets, stretched their legs, relaxed a bit.

They had fought hard for this moment. It felt good.

Supervisor Tells Of F.S.A. Plans

Plans for the new fiscal year, together with reappointed and new members of the Coos-Curry County FSA committee, were announced this week by E. W. Hughes, County Farm Security Supervisor, Bank Building, Coquille.

Bert Davenport, Myrtle Point, was re-appointed for another year, while J. Q. Corrie, Prosper, was named a new member of the committee, replacing Ralph Christensen, Coquille, whose term expired, June 30. After serving for three years, committeemen cannot be re-elected until a year has elapsed. Mr. Corrie operates a 70-acre dairy farm. He belongs to the Dairy Co-op, Grange, American Legion, IOOF lodge and has served on the school board in his community.

"First, important new work being taken over by the County FSA committee for the new fiscal year which began July 1, is an inventory of community and individual borrowers needs for Farm Security loans and services," Hughes said, "This will provide the basis for fitting the FSA program to meet local farm conditions both in terms of individual community and county needs."

All FSA loan applications for operating goods, water facilities, group services and farm ownership are reviewed and approved by the committee to make the best possible use of available credit and management assistance, reported Hughes. Funds appropriated for the new year provided about the same amount for rehabilitation loans as last year, but farm ownership loans will be heavily curtailed due to difficulties in securing good farms at reasonable prices.

"Work of the County FSA committee has been largely responsible for the local accomplishments of the program and I want to publicly thank them for the time and thought they have given to this important job," Hughes said. "With funds again available for FSA activities, I am sure their stewardship of the program will add further to the welfare, war food production and farm assets of every community."
