School Lunch Program Discussed

School administrators and others met yesterday in Superintendent Mayfield's office in Marshfield, in order to discuss the school lunch program. This meeting was requested by Carl H. Hasencamp, administrative assistant with the War Food Administration, through County School Superintendent Martha E. Mulkey.

Mr. Hasencamp stated that the requirements for re-imbursment through his department were very much as had been set up for the school year 1943-44, it being possible to provide either of the three Type A, Type B, or Type C luncheon. The first is a complete school lunch; the second, a partial lunch to supplement what the children bring from home, and the third, milk only.

Besides the partial re-imbursment which is allowed by the government, there may be an opportunity to receive some free commodities with the payment of handling of transportation charges.

Wacs Celebrate 1st Anniversary With A Parade In Italy

Corporal Wilda M. Van Meter, of Coquille, was one of the approximately six hundred members of the Women's Army Corps stationed in Italy, who paraded September 1 in recognition of the first anniversary of the formation of the Women's Army Corps as a component of the Army of the United States.

The review was staged on the parade area where Italian Armies were reviewed by the King of Italy and in recent years by Mussolini.

Of the Wacs in that Sept. 1 formation, over 200 were sworn into the Army just a year before to the day at a ceremony in North Africa at which they were reviewed by General Dwight B. Eisenhower.

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
