

### Coquille Unit Red Cross Notes

Mrs. D. B. Kesner has just been informed by the Coos county chairman of production that "We are just about to launch our new fall and winter quota of Red Cross sewing and knitting—that it will be heavy—so arrange to interest more workers as soon as possible."

Mrs. Kesner also states that the following excerpts from a letter recently received from Area Officer in San Francisco should adequately answer those persons who have inquired as to the necessity for much Red Cross work now that the war is so nearly over in Europe: "There are more calls for hospital comfort items than ever before, both for the military hospitals and the hospital ships as there are approximately 50,000 casualties a month coming back home for treatment. So what can we do but work harder than ever?" The items referred to include bathrobes, bed jackets, bed shirts, bedside bags, kit bags, pajamas, scuff slippers and wash cloths.

"Our knitting quota has not yet been given but, no doubt, will be received very soon," says Mrs. Kesner, production chairman.

Coquille Red Cross will meet as usual on Friday, Sept. 29, from 1:30 to 4:30 p. m. in Guild Hall to sew, knit, crochet, cut squares, etc. Yarn for distribution consists of O. D. for V-neck Army sweaters and white wool for various types of stump socks. Until the new materials are received, the ladies will continue to make baby nighties, caps and pieced out flannel baby blankets from left-over scraps, in addition to the afghan lap robes and crocheted wash cloths.

The following are thanked for yarn, wool material, wash cloths, muslin and relief clothing: Mesdames Geo. Sherwood, Mary Hatcher, Edna Rakestraw, F. Homenyk and J. D. Rankin. The Unit thanks Mrs. W. W. Winnegar for the unusually lovely afghan turned in. Mrs. E. D. McCune assisted in cutting.
