"Dearest Mom and Chuck: I hope If it is insurance, see me. -F. R could read it. I'm getting along fine and you needn't worry about me, especially if you don't hear from me for a long time as mail service takes longer going back to the States than coming over. Also I won't have as much time to write as I did in the States. I'm no longer living in an apple orchard taking life easy.
