est in number of hours, wore their attractive white uniforms and made an inspiring picture. They were Mesdames F. L. Greenough, Otto Zentnef and Geo. Howe. Mrs. Alborn introduced Mesdames Hall, Homenyk and Candlin as outstanding in their contributions of knitting and assistance in her work. Mrs. Homenyk has knitted two hundred sweaters, besides other articles. Mrs. Pete Norton is another with a knitting record. Mrs. C. L. Tuttle, in charge of the work table, introduced some of her helpers at work on the platform transforming small scraps of old clothing into warm and pretty afghans for the boys in the hospitals who are able to sit up. Nearly all of the cutting since the start of the Red Cross sewing has been done by Mrs. L. A. Lundquist and Mrs. A. N. Gould. Hundreds of yards of khaki, muslin, flannel and prints, which come in from headquarters have been cut and made into kit aprons, bed bags, jackets, pajamas, hospital coats and bathrobes. Mrs. McIntee, Mrs. A. B. Schroeder and Mrs. Grant are among the busy sewers outstanding in time given and work done.

A display of the types of work from these departments was on exhibition and after viewing it one could only marvel at the fine work progressing quietly in Coquille, with a record being made in the quantity. Mrs. Ida Owen has made 14 afghans. Misses Inez and Leah Rover played a medley of World War I songs, which brought to mind the Red Cross Work at that time. Mrs. G. W. Tyrrell sang two beautiful numbers reminiscent of the World War I, "The Rose of No Man's Land" and "My Hero."

In closing Mrs. Lawrence made these announcements: The work room at the Guild Hall is open Friday afternoons from 1:30 to 4:00. Fall and winter work will consist of hospital services, mainly gowns, bed jackets, bathrobes, pajamas, scuff slippers, and wash cloths. The knitting will continue. Army and Navy sweaters, beanies and gloves, regular socks and various types of stump and toe socks are needed. More afghans and scraps of wool for the squares to make them are needed; 4x4 to 8x8 and larger are wanted. Red Cross invites you to join in some part of this necessary work. National and international recognition of B. P. W. Week was stressed in a talk by Mrs. James Richmond. This year's consideration for its members, she said, is, "Are We Part-time Citizens?" The local club's hobby is its scholarship loan fund, which in bonds and cash is \$3,000 or more.

Mrs. Boober introduced a plan to promote informality and friendliness by setting aside a given time for an exchange of ideas along subjects of particular interest to individuals to be presented by volunteer discussion. It was tried out Tuesday and promises to be interesting and enlightening. Tea was served with Mrs. R. E. Milne, hostess chairman, and the following on her committee: Mesdames L. W.
