

Red Devils Repeat 31-0 Score Saturday

From the moment a Myrtle Point Bobcat fumbled the Red Devils kick-off opening the game here last Saturday afternoon and Coquille recovered, followed by several first downs and George Hurst went around his left end for a touchdown, there was never any doubt as to the final result, the only unknown feature being the size of the score. And strangely enough it was an exact duplicate of the score at Roseburg when the Red Devils won, 31 to 0.

After one of their five touchdowns, Coquille was able to buck over for the extra point but all other one

point efforts were futile. The second touchdown, which came in the second quarter, was scored by Dave Kline, who caught a long pass and eluded M. P. tacklers to score. Dave also shone in intercepting a long Bobcat pass on his own 10-yard line.

Hurst scored the third touchdown in the third quarter and Bob Alborn the fourth on line plays.

The last scoring by the Red Devils was another spectacular play in the last quarter, Tom Boots intercepting a P. M. pass and running about thirty yards to pay dirt.

Coach Leslie says that he checked several plays which needed to be smoothed out but on the whole was well satisfied with the showing. Although it turned out successfully, possibly because of the surprise element, the throwing of a pass by one of his tossers, who are Bud Meek and Bob Alborn, on the fourth down was something the coach did not approve.

All members of the squad played a bang-up game and it didn't seem to make any difference whether the starting line-up, or substitutes were playing, the march of victory continued.

Those starting the game were Dick Buckles at center; Joe Stone and Bob Kelley, guards; Jim Kimsey and Wayne Chexem, tackles; Harold Train and Floyd DeNoma, ends; Bob Alborn, quarter; Dave Kline and Bud Meek, halves; Geo. Hurst, full-back.

The second team which was interspersed gradually into play consisted of Billings at center; Jack Blum and Kenneth Necley at guard; Stacy Johnson and Morris Williams, tackles; Bob Jenkins and Jack Stevens, ends; George Johnson, quarter; Tom Boots, half; Walt McKinney, full, and Chuck Stephenson, tackle.

There was a huge crowd in attendance at the game and Coquille boosters were well satisfied with the showing made by the Red Devils against a team which so often has proved to be a hoodoo, but Coach Leslie says there are a number of rough spots which he hopes to have eliminated before the crucial game with North Bend High at the Bay this coming Saturday.
