County Meeting To Honor Rural Women

Mrs. Buena Maris, Dean of Women at Oregon State College, will be the guest speaker on November 4, in Coquille, at a county-wide meeting honoring rural women of Coos county and the contribution they have made toward our nation's "Food for Freedom" program. The meeting will be held at the Odd Fellows Hall, beginning at 10:30 a. m.

Mrs. Maris is well known in Coos county. In 1940 and 1941 as Family Relationships Specialist for Oregon State College Extension, she conducted monthly training courses in Family Relationships. She also made numerous appearances before civic organizations.

In the fall of 1942, Mrs. Maris accepted the position of Dean of Women at Oregon State College and in the fall of 1943 took a year's leave of absence to act as Personal Director of a large war plant at Pasco, Washington. This fall Mrs. Maris returned to the State College campus.

Other features on the day's program will be a Style Revue of Remodeled Garments by various members of extension units. Dorothy Gibney and Agnes Luscombe, Champion Girls' 4-H Demonstration Team, will present their demonstration, "A Proper Hem Gives a Professional Look," as they presented it in Portland at the State 4-H Club Show.

Another feature of the day's activities will be the contest calling attention to the contribution Coos county women have made to the nation's "Food for Freedom" program and to find, if possible, the women who have made the greatest contribution. The award will be presented at the noon luncheon by Mrs. Sheldon Sackett of Marshfield, member of the State Board of Higher Education.

Don Bolt To Be First Forum Speaker

The first forum of the Institute of International Understandings, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Coquille, will be held in the High School auditorium at eight o'clock next Tuesday evening, October 31. Tickets at 50c are available at the High School and at the City Hall.

Don Bolt, of Brazil, Indiana, will be the principal speaker. His subject will be "The Role of the North American Continent." Mr. Bolt will also talk to the students of the Coquille schools Tuesday afternoon.

This will be the first of a series of four Institute programs presented by the Rotary Club as a service to the community. The other three programs are scheduled for November 7, November 28, and December 5.

Don Bolt, traveler, journalist and commentator, served in the British Merchant Marine and in the British and American forces during the first World War. Subsequently he traveled extensively throughout the United States and around the world, as late as the summer of 1939, spending considerable time in Continental Europe, especially in Germany. He has devoted special attention to the Latin American countries, making three visits to Mexico within the past year.

During his newspaper career he served on the staff of the Chicago Herald and American, the Indianapolis News and the St. Louis Globe Democrat. His career with the Indianapolis News and the Pittsburgh Post was heightened by special assignments he was privileged to receive to "cover" mine wars of West Virginia and Illinois, and the renowned "evolution" trial in Dayton, Tennessee.

Following his metropolitan newspaper career he became radio commentator for the National Broadcasting Company and later served as new editor and staff commentator for Station WAAF in Chicago.

Because of special interest and aptitude for understanding international events and their meaning for the United States, Mr. Bolt has recently entered upon a career of free lance writing, commenting, and lecturing on foreign affairs.

Mayor's Navy Day Proclamation

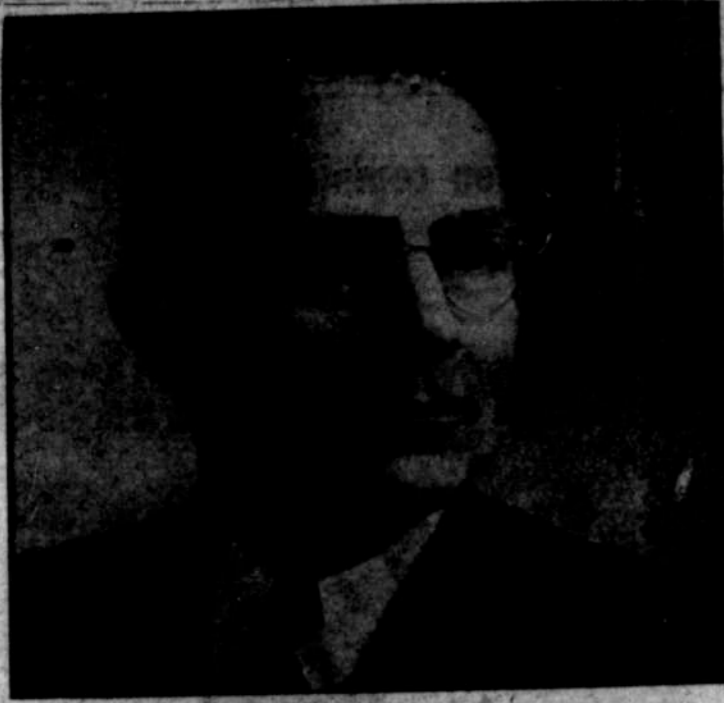
Whereunto, I have set my hand this 24th day of October, nineteen hundred and forty-four.

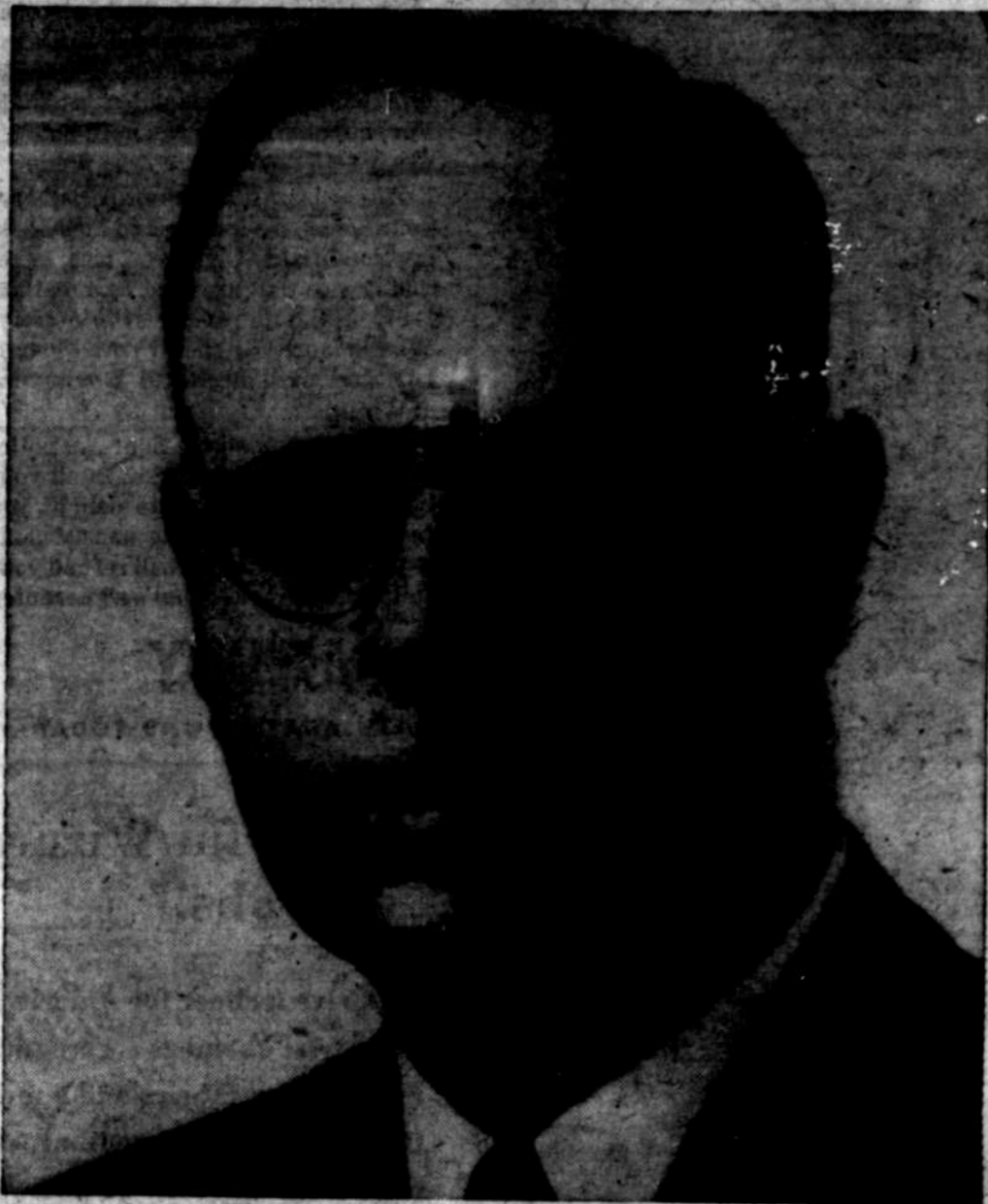
