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**Alaskans Ask Dewey's Election**  
Up in Alaska which, because it is a territory, the residents cannot vote for U. S. president, an "Alaska for Dewey-Bricker Club" has been organized with headquarters at Juneau, and the club has addressed a letter to voters in the U. S., asking them to cast their ballot for the Republican candidates. The letter reads:

**Dear Fellow American Citizen:**  
We urge you to vote for Dewey and Bricker in November. The Japs have been driven out of Alaska, but Alaska was the only North American soil on which they landed. We Alaskans are American citizens, but we can't vote for President because we are disenfranchised. People, like us, who live in American territories, have no vote for President even though our lands may be invaded by the Japs.

We know, perhaps better than you, how badly Alaska needs a change of administration, needs Dewey and Bricker to run our nation. We must rely upon you fellow American citizens who reside in the States to elect them, because we have no vote in National elections even though we are American citizens.

To the many national reasons why Dewey and Bricker should be elected, you must add Alaska's special needs and reasons. Remember! you are interested in Alaska because its minerals, fisheries, and other great natural resources belong to all American citizens. Remember! your boys in the Armed Forces look to Alaska as the place of opportunity where, when the War is won, as we know it will eventually be, they can, with true, old-fashioned American independence and freedom, earn their livelihood, build their home, raise their families.

Their dreams and hopes cannot come true unless Dewey and Bricker are elected. No state, no country, is worse bureau-ridden than Alaska. No bureaucrat is more bureaucratic than Ickes. For 12 long years FDR has kept Ickes in power. The minerals of the Western States and of Alaska were developed under the U. S. mining laws. Ickes is against those laws. Ickes wants all Alaskan minerals put under a permit system. Ickes wants control over every Alaskan prospector and miner. Control means political power. Ickes wants that power.

Settlers, homesteaders, farmers and miners can now use waters of Alaskan streams just as our pioneer forefathers used creek waters in the States. Ickes doesn't like that American way. Ickes wants to control every Alaskan river, stream, creek, even the rivulets. Then Ickes can dictate when, how, and to what extent the miner, farmer, homesteader, settler, can use the water flowing past his door. Control means political power. Ickes wants that power.

In 1943 Ickes created six Indian reservations in Alaska, including one of 1,400,000 acres for 33 aborigines in the Chandalar district. Right now, one of his Bureaus is considered three petitions to give to not more than 1200 Indians exclusive rights to the uplands, tidelands, and salt and fresh water of millions of acres in Southeastern Alaska. At least four other similar petitions have been filed covering other parts of Southeastern Alaska. If granted, and the threat is plain that these reservations will be created, white labor and capital will be shut out from use of the fish, minerals, timber, waters, and other resources of all of Southeastern Alaska, and Alaska itself will have no power to raise taxes therein for its government. Once Ickes gives Southeastern Alaska back to the Indians, nothing can stop him from returning all of Alaska to the Eskimos and Indians. Indian reservations will give control to Ickes over the Indians. The Indians are too simple to understand that Ickes will rule them with an iron hand. But, control means political power. Ickes wants power.

Will Ickes keep his job if Dewey is elected? No! but, if FDR is re-elected Ickes will have Alaska under his thumb. Dewey's election alone can save Alaska. We urge, we plead, we beg you to vote for Dewey and Bricker on November 7th and to save Alaska from Ickes and bureaucracy. Keep Alaska as a land of opportunity for the boys in the Service and for all American citizens. Elect Dewey. R. E. Robertson.

**Sig Eckholm Dies Friday Morning**  
Sig Eckholm, a former resident of Coquille when he was foreman of the S. P. section crew here, and later moved to Coaledo when he was transferred to the job at Coos Bay, died last Friday morning as he was proceeding in his car from home to Marshfield.

His death occurred beyond the Mid-way Service Station, on a straight stretch of road. There was a heavy fog that morning but the most probable cause of the collision of his car with a high-way roller, is that he suffered a heart attack, that his foot pressed on the accelerator and, without his ability to steer, that his car veered from the pavement. The roller was standing nine feet and four inches off the pavement but his car hit it headon with such force as to break an axle on the roller.

Mr. Eckholm had not been feeling well for some days, and although his neck was broken by the collision, that was probably not the cause of his death. Stanley Phillips, of the S. P. force at Myrtle Point, says that the deceased never drove more than 25 miles an hour.

Mr. Eckholm was 60 years of age and is survived by his widow; a daughter residing near Myrtle Point, and three sons, Oke and Carl, who are in the service, and George, who attends Coquille High School.

**Two Sentenced In Circuit Court Tuesday—One To Jail**  
Thurston Edward Crumley, arrested last week on a forgery by endorsement charge, which offense he had committed at Marshfield, pleaded guilty in circuit court here on Tuesday and was sentenced to five years in the pen. Sheriff Howell left with him for Salem this morning.

Thos. J. Walker, bound over to the grand jury in justice court at North Bend last Saturday, waived arraignment in circuit court on Tuesday, pleaded guilty and was sentenced by Judge Dal King to five years in the pen. The judge then ordered a stay of execution for 30 days, after which he is to be placed on parole for two years.

Another prisoner in the county jail is Fred Card Lee, sentenced in justice court at the Bay to serve ten days in jail and pay \$4 costs and a \$20 fine. He was brought over here on Monday this week for being drunk on a public highway.
