Wilford Wasson A Graduate At Army Gunnery School

Pfc. Wasson entered the Army at Portland, Oregon, June 14, 1943, after attending Coquille High School.

Wasson went through a ground school course in which he was taught the principles of ballistics, sighting, turret maintenance, range estimation and aircraft machine guns. Following a protracted course on the gunnery range, where he shot the .22 rifle, shot-gun and calibre .30 and .50 machine guns, he was given two weeks of air firing before being presented with his gunnery wings.
