Washington, D. C., Oct. 19 - Between Jan. 1, 1934, and December, 1941, (Pearl Harbor was Dec. 7, 1941), the United States treasury paid a premium to Japan of \$291,283,804 on gold purchased.

The premium is the difference between the old price of gold \$20.67 per fine ounce, and the new price of \$35 per fine ounce. This much is known from the records of the treasury department. Japan, of itself, produces little gold, but in addition to the premium known to have been paid, Japan is suspected of having secured an even greater amount by shipping gold to Canada and to London.

American purchases from London and Canada in that period were enormous and it is asserted that the Japanese took gold from Manchuria and China to supplement its own production and sold it to the treasury through those then neutral countries. Great Britain received a premium in excess of two and a quarter billion dollars, and Canada a premium of almost two billion dollars. No figures of gold purchases from any country since Pearl Harbor are available. The acknowledged gold entered the United States at Seattle and San Francisco.

Representatives of the lumber industry in the national capital predict the closing of scores of small sawmills in the days immediately following the war - plants now producing 25,000 feet in an eight-hour shift. These plants, they explain, operate principally on logs which come from independent timber owners and as these owners cut they also reduce their source of supply. There is such a heavy demand for lumber, and such inroads are being made to meet these requirements, that the timber suitable to these small operations is rapidly disappearing.

The more inaccessible timber can afford to be reached by large operators, and these outfits have years of supply ahead of them. The war situation has made the timber owners and the lumber industry more alive to the necessity of complying with the practice of the "annual yield" - not to cut more timber than the annual growth of an area. State laws requiring loggers to leave a certain percentage of standing timber to reseed will be more strictly enforced in order to have a perpetual supply of timber for the future needs of the nation.

Just as soon as the war in Europe is over scores of thousands of Europeans intend migrating to the United States instead of remaining in their native land to rehabilitate it. The American Legion recognizes that a flood of foreigners will make the job situation in the United States difficult and they wish to curb it. They are asking that immigration be suspended for several years after the war, until the millions of Americans in uniform are demobilized and have found work. Since Hitler came into power innumerable "refugees" have come into the United States on visitor's permit and many others have been smuggled in, until no one knows the exact number of these aliens.

The five proposed dams on Snake river to improve navigation as far as Lewiston, Ida., appear to have successfully run the gantlet and are items in the rivers and harbors bill which has passed the house. As a matter of fact, the five dams will be built in that section of Snake river which is in the state of Washington. They are part of the development of the Columbia basin, the great irrigation project to be watered from Grand Coulee dam and are needed to carry the heavy products of Idaho down the Snake and Columbia to tidewater. Idaho is expecting important overseas trade and believes this improvement will be of material assistance in realizing this expectation.

The idea lurking in the minds of advocates of the five Snake river dams is that products from Idaho will be taken to the Vancouver-Portland area for processing or shipped "as is" to the orient. If the program for the dams is carried through they should be built by the time the first section of the Grand Coulee reclamation project is ready for settlement.
