This issue of this column is dedicated to a real lover of wildlife, the daughter of an old pioneer family of Coos county and a lady who really has the interest of wildlife at heart and has demonstrated that fact to our entire satisfaction. At the present time she is living on Eden ridge and has a bevy of chipmunks which she feeds. Each month she spends a lot of good money on food for the squirrels and birds and makes pets of them all.
 What a contrast is this lady's effort to protect and propagate wildlife, to care for the squirrels and birds, to that of the boys who are armed with 22s and air-rifles and are engaged in the slaying of every bird and small denizen of our woodlands.

The lady whose deeds we are discussing recently wrote us as follows: "You know, Lans, we are way up here on Eden Ridge, about fifteen miles above Powers. Yesterday at one p. m. a Sea Brant flew in front of the house and it lit behind a log on the hillside in front of our shack. Guess it must have been there a half an-hour or so when I saw a big hawk go down after it. I got the .32 and shot enough to scare it away and it lit on a snag right by the shack and, Lans, I shot 13 times at it and never hit a feather. Well, when Bill came in from work he went up where the Brant had lit and there it lay dead. The hawk had killed it. Guess that proves I have never killed by shooting."
 We are sorry that this lady's shooting has been so sadly neglected, so that she could have "potted" the hawk. Regardless of what so-called naturalists have to offer on the subject, there are many hawks that are downright destroyers of our wildlife. In fact, ninety-nine per cent of them are.
 This lady further states that a Forest Ranger, accompanied by 17

boys, stopped at her place last summer and informed her that way up there, miles from civilization, they had found poison bait strung through the woods. That's some more of that excellent work(?) performed by so-called Government hunters.

Such work as that gives a real sportsman chills. Not being satisfied with poisoning sheep ranges, the poison slingers carry their operations into the big woods far away from the ranges and succeed in killing off the marten, weon, squirrels and both valuable and innocents of the woods.
 We are thankful to have such a lady as the one mentioned on our side of the fence in the fight for the preservation and conservation of wildlife.
 We receive many letters from our readers, but mostly they are from sportsmen, interested in hunting and fishing. It is unusual to receive communications from a lady and especially one vitally interested in the welfare of our wildlife and one who spends hard-earned cash on food for birds and squirrels. That is why we take pleasure in dedicating this issue to this swell person—Mamie Kinnunen. More power to you, Mamie! We salute you!
