"Bill" is a tall young man a head taller than the 15th Air Force, and was seen to have gone down over Germany many weeks ago. No details at all are available as to his miraculous escape. But a telegram from headquarters assures his mother that "Bill" is alive and well and back on active duty again. The prayers of his many friends have been answered, and the boy has been safely returned to the fold.

He took his father, Mrs. Helen Carl who had been visiting relatives in this section for about six weeks, up to her Hubbard ranch. She expects to return to Coquille about the first of the year.

Major Carl had been in the Hawaiian Islands for some time and is to report at a station in Florida on Dec. 6. Before the U. S. entered the war Major Carl was an Army Reserve officer but has been in the regular Army since then.

His brother, Maxton, also well known here, has been released from the service and is now operating the farm at Hubbard.

Has Been In Ten Major Naval Battles

Bill was just sixteen when he enlisted and he has gone through the Aleutian campaign, the Gilbert, the Marshall, the Kavieng, New Ireland, the Marianas at Saipan, Guam and Tinian, the Palau, the Philippines at Leyte and Surigao. He is to be on shipboard again the twenty-seventh of December but, in the meantime, it is wonderful to be home.

Riverton Boy Suffers Broken Leg In Europe

Mr. and Mrs. William Church, who live on the North Bank Road near Riverton, have just received word that their son, S. Sgt. Quentin E. Church, 207944, of the 42nd Infantry Division, is overseas somewhere in an army hospital with a broken leg. No other details are available at this writing.

S. Sgt. Church graduated from the Riverton High School in 1939 in the class with Charles Owen Hartwell and Robert McCue. McCue operates a farm near the Church ranch, and Hartwell is in the Navy. Quentin enlisted in the army on Nov. 20, 1939. He was classified for foreign service in the Coast Artillery and spent four years in Panama before he ever had his first furlough.

After his visit home, he has spent the greater part of this year in further training at bases here in the United States. During the early part of the year while training in North Carolina, he transferred from the Coast Artillery to the Infantry. He was home again for a short time in August and returned to Camp Atterbury, Indiana, for further training and to await shipment somewhere overseas. He has not been gone from these shores very long and it is not known just what part of the theatre of war he is in now.

Capt. Jack Hunt Receives Purple Heart

Mrs. Harry Hunt has received word from her son, Capt. Jack Hunt, who was reported as wounded in action in France on Nov. 13, in a letter written from a hospital somewhere across the Atlantic, that he expects to be out in a short time and as good as new. He received the bronze medal after the action at St. Lo and has since also received the Purple Heart.

Staff Sgt. Willard Knife Home For 30-Day Furlough

Staff Sergeant Willard Knife, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Knife of this city and who has been with the Army in the South Pacific for two years, came in for a 30-day furlough Monday evening and to visit his parents and other relatives. He will be here till after Christmas and when he reports back for duty it will be at a camp near New Orleans. He has been in the service for three years.

Ralph Willson Improving At Hospital In England

Mr. and Mrs. A. F. Willson, of this city, this week received a letter from their son, Ralph, that he is now recuperating in England from injuries he received in France. He did not say how seriously he was wounded, nor the date, but that he is improving is welcome news to his parents and his wife, who now resides in Coquille. Ralph was awarded the Purple Heart following his injuries.
