Boys Really Needed For Radar Training in The U. S. Navy

Broadening its search for men possessing basic aptitudes fitting them for training in radar, the U. S. Navy is urging all men entering the Navy either as enlistees from the 17-year-old group or as inductees from the Selective Service age group, who have at least one year of high school algebra, to take the Navy's Eddy test for radar training.

This was announced by Walter F. Patrie, of the Marshfield-Eugene Navy recruiting station, who said it is likely that many men with such a background may qualify for radar training, leading to quick advancement in naval service as well as to opportunities in the post-war field of electronics.

The Eddy test, it was emphasized, is nothing for the man of average intelligence and education to shy away from, consisting merely of problems of basic mathematics, fundamental electricity, elementary physics, practical shopwork and simple radio, with stress placed upon math.

Many of the radio and electricity questions therein may be answered simply by reasoning or thinking them out and do not necessarily require any previous experience in these fields for solution. Candidates were advised that when taking the test, it is preferable to make an intelligent guess rather than to leave any question unanswered.

Complete information concerning the Eddy test and other details of the Navy radar training program, which offers petty officer ratings to candidates completing this training, will be supplied at any Navy recruiting station.

Please Give Way To Furloughs On Christmas Trips, Says S. P.

"Let the space you might occupy on a train from December 15 to January 10 be your holiday gift to some service man or his family," is the suggestion of F. S. McGinnis, vice president in charge of system passenger traffic for Southern-Pacific Company.

Military and essential business travel will require at least 90 per cent of all train space in that period, McGinnis pointed out. The remaining accommodations, he said, will be eagerly sought by furloughers and by families of service men for visits to training camps.

"Civilians who can defer their train trips until after January 10 will be making the Christmas season a much happier one for many service men and members of their families," McGinnis declared.

F.S.A. Ready To Help Farm Lease Problems

Coos and Curry counties farm tenants, landowners and communities can benefit from improved farm-tenure agreements during the next three months when most lease and rental agreements for 1945 are being signed, according to E. W. Hughes, County Farm Security Administration Supervisor, Room 14, Bank Building, Coquille.

A flexible farm lease form, developed by the department of agriculture, is offered by FSA as a basis upon which landlords may work out a detailed, written agreement to fit their needs. The form provides for the traditional responsibilities of landlords and tenants, and in addition has special suggestions to encourage improvements by the tenant and arbitration of disputes between landlord and tenant.

FSA services for tenure improvements are open to any farmer or landlords in the county who wish help in working out satisfactory rental agreements that will help the tenant, safeguard the landlord's investment and guard the fertility of the land. Frequent changes of tenants tend to run down the land with excessive cash cropping, and provide little assurance of maintaining buildings and farm improvements.

Present tenure problems in the county are reflected by a recent survey which indicates thirty per cent of the farmers in Coos and Curry counties are tenants and about one out of three move every year. Long leases on a written basis encourage a tenant family to become part of the community, keep the farm in repair, and plant crops, livestock and rotations that will keep up the soil. It was brought out that frequent moves are costly to both the landlord and tenant and disrupt community life.

Copies of the form and help with rental agreements may be secured through the county FSA Office on Mondays through Fridays from 8:00 to 4:00 and on Saturdays 8:00 to 12:00.

Record O. & C. Timber Sales Made

O. and C. timber sales made in November by the General Land Office of the Department of the Interior broke all sales records for timber value in a single month, according to W. H. Horning, Chief Forester for O. & C. Administration.

November sales included 37 separate tracts of timber carrying an estimated total volume of 117,651,700 board feet valued at \$547,325.55.

These 37 timber tracts were located in eleven of the eighteen Oregon counties having O. & C. Revested railroad lands within their boundaries. Those involved included Benton, Clackamas, Columbia, Coos, Douglas, Jackson, Josephine, Klamath, Lane, Linn and Polk counties.

All five of the O. & C. Administrative districts were represented, including field offices at Salem, Eugene, Roseburg, Marshfield and Medford.

Thirty of the 110 sustained yield operating areas were represented. Each of these has a capacity to sustain an average sized Oregon sawmill on a continuous lumber production basis. The disposition of timber on each tract was based on the timber-producing capacity of the local operating area. This perpetual production of timber at a stabilized rate is accomplished on the revested grant lands.

Mr. Horning states that sustained yield cutting of timber on O. & C. lands is not only a limit which must not be exceeded; it also is the amount which must be produced to supply the needs of local industry. He points out that a steady flow of timber to market must continue permanently. To workers, that means steady employment. To the counties which receive 50 per cent of the earnings in place of taxes, it means a secure source of county income.
