(Continued from Page One) Commission for beer permits were approved by the council for W. O. Morris, on Front street, for a Class B package and retail Class B; for Safeway for a Class B package; for Glenn W. Brannon at the Fasttime for a Class B retail and class B package, and for a Club permit for the F. O. Eagles.

The street committee, by John Purkey, reported that flood waters in the Fifth street gulch can be kept off the property, whose owner has refused to pay improvement assessments until the waters were controlled, by installing an 8-inch tile drainage line of 150 feet under the Henry street bridge and nearby, and it was ordered done.

Many complaints have been made by the property owners living along the county road east from the end of Second street, that garbage is being dumped along the road and on the roads leading to the county dump by those who haul their own garbage and who will not stop at the city hall to secure the key which would enable them to get into the city's dump grounds.

Mayor Wood stated that after his conference with E. L. Benham, who has the garbage removal license in the city, it was thought best to remove the chain from the entrance to the dump grounds, and signs will be placed up there asking the co-operation of those taking up their garbage, that they drop it in the ravine where the Benham truck dumps its loads and it is believed such co-operation will be accorded the city by those who haul their own garbage.

At the suggestion of Water Superintendent he was instructed to raise the pipes in manholes in the north part of the city, where gravel from the streets with that kind of a surface, is washed into the manholes. The catch-basin in these manholes is near the bottom instead of at the top where the gravel could be easily cleaned out.

Charles H. Bunch Passes Monday

(Continued from Page One) Four children were born to this union who, with their mother, survive. They are Mrs. I. R. Nosler, of San Diego; Levi L. Bunch, of Coquille; Dr. F. Grant Bunch, of Medford, and Mrs. Jennie Boggan, of Powers. Two sisters also survive, Mrs. R. W. Airey and Mrs. Alice Holt, both of whom reside in California.

Mrs. Bunch, with a brother and a brother-in-law, built and operated the first sawmill in Coquille, on the site where the Johnson mill was located until a few years ago. After three or four years they sold the mill to Binger Hermann and Mr. Bunch then engaged in the sheep business until 1891, after which he traded for the ranch on Rink creek where he has since resided.

Mr. Bunch became a member of the Seventh Day Adventist Church when he united with the first Adventist church organized west of the Rocky Mountains and north of California, at Milton, Ore., in the late 1870's. His sister, Mrs. Bennett, now deceased, was a charter member of that church.

Although Mr. Bunch was an ardent Republican and an active worker in that party all his life, he had never held, nor sought, election as a public official.
