Councilman Geo. Ulett was named as chairman of the city's Planning Commission and asked to name the balance of the commission from ladies and men not on the council.

The Division of Public Safety was again named by the mayor to consist of the Fire Chief, the City Engineer and the City Health Officer.

The Sentinel was named as the city's official newspaper.

Card room and pool and billiard room licenses were granted for six months to the following, figures indicated the license fee paid—W. H. Fortier, \$150; Glen Brannon, \$125; C. L. Elkins, \$125.

Restaurant licenses were granted the following after their places of business have been inspected—Mrs. Marlin Brandon, Mrs. Sue Aitken, Ethel Lester and Lena Fribble.

The \$5000 bond posted by City Recorder F. G. Leslie and \$10,000 bond by City Treasurer Coughell were both approved by the council.

At Engineer Gearhart's suggestion, the council approved the plan for the resurfacing of Willard street between First and Second, First from Willard to Hall, and the redecking of the Beach street bridge as the improvements which the city will make to use Coquille's share, from the State Highway Commission, of the state's gasoline tax. It amounted to \$4600 last year, and the city agrees to spend the tax money on street improvements. Due to the war, the Highway Commission does not insist that the funds be spent at once, but the program for the post-war era must be set up with them. Last year the city listed the purchase of a street grader as soon as one can be secured.

The sewage disposal plant matter, which is not being pushed by the state authorities during the war, was brought up by Mayor Wood, who said that there are two sites on the old Klatsner ranch, now owned by K. Franklin and Geo. E. Oerding, which would be suitable. One is in the corner, across the road from the S. P. Depot and the other on a higher point. A committee to confer with Messrs. Franklin and Oerding in regard to an option on a site was named by the mayor. Its members are Councilmen Gray, Taylor and Ulett.

The possibility that the land between the Cunningham railroad and Sanford Heights, across the highway from the Masonic cemetery, might, in the near future, become more or less of an industrial center, led to considerable discussion of what the city would have to do to provide a trunk line sewer for that district. It is thought that Sanford Heights, the Gould tract and a part of Burns Acres owners might desire sewer connection—and the council is considering the possibility of installing a trunk sewer about 3,000 feet in length from that section over to the point where the disposal plant may be located.

No action in that regard was taken Tuesday evening but should the project now brewing become an actuality it will be necessary that the sewer be installed.
