In past years only boys belonged to the patrol but this year both boys and girls serve and the number totals some thirty traffic officers.

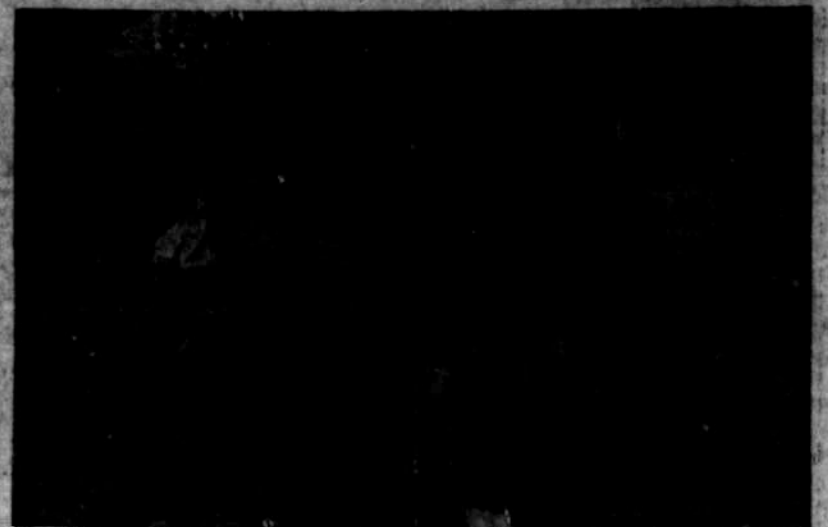
Last year at the suggestion of the Lions Club, the local salvage committee donated money to purchase raincoats and hats for the young officers to wear during the wet season.
