Another Coos county pioneer, William Taylor Dement, who had lived his entire life in Coos county, passed away at his home in Myrtle Point last Thursday evening. Funeral services were held at the Schroeder Bros. Mortuaries in Myrtle Point at two o'clock Monday afternoon.

Mr. Dement was born on Dement creek in 1869 and was nearly 76 years of age. For many of his active years Mr. Dement was a most influential Coos county citizen and he served two terms as county commissioner as mayor of Myrtle Point.

He is survived by his widow, the former Nellie Figg of Coquille; by a son, Wallace B. Dement, Myrtle Point attorney, and a daughter, Lt. Alice Dement, U.S.N.R., of San Diego.
