Army Unit Of Former Coquille Boy Receives Citation

The following from the Democrat-Herald of Albany, Ore., refers to a family who lived in or near Coquille for several years when Geo. Zinslerling was a mechanic at the Smith plant. The young man, Sgt. David A. Zinslerling, was a graduate of Coquille High six years ago and was also employed at the plant here for some time. When he lived here he was known as Allen Zinslerling:

Mr. and Mrs. George Zinslerling, R.F.D. No. 3, Albany, are in receipt of a citation issued to the entire 591st field artillery battalion for its exemplary service during the period from December 24 to January 9 in support of the 424th infantry of the 106th infantry division in turning back the Germans driving into Belgium. Their son, Sgt. David A. Zinslerling, is a member of this field artillery unit.

The citation commended his unit particularly for its "audacious withdrawal from (its first position) by moving forward toward the enemy front lines in order to make use of the only open road, and for continuous and close support of division from December 24, 1944, to January 9, 1945.

Sgt. Zinslerling enlisted in the army December 8, 1941, the day after Pearl Harbor was bombed. He was trained at Camp Roberts and was engaged for three years at Ft. Sill, Okla., as a field artillery instructor before going overseas.

In many respects Sgt. Zinslerling's military career parallels that of his father, who was a field artilleryman and a field artillery instructor during World War No. 1 also before going overseas. The father enlisted at Oregon City in 1917.

Guy Haynes, Back From Europe, In Army Hospital in Colorado

From Portland comes information from Mrs. Eleanor Brown that Sgt. Guy Haynes, son of Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Haynes who formerly lived in Coquille but now reside in Eugene, is back in the United States and is receiving treatment at a hospital in Colorado. He had seen active duty in France, Holland and Belgium, and is suffering from trench foot.

His brother, Lieut. Earl O. Haynes, is expected home soon on furlough from his post in New Mexico. He expects before a great while to be sent overseas as an air pilot.

Marvin Goodman, S 2/c, who is taking Officers' Training at Willamette University, is enjoying a leave at his home. He graduated from Coquille High in 1940. His football and basketball prowess are common knowledge in Coquille, as well as his dramatic visit in Hawaii in December, 1941. Marvin will return to Salem, Friday, where he will graduate in June.

Ed McCarthy has recovered from his wounds and writes his mother that he is back in action in Belgium. He told of receiving a letter from Dee Krantz and states that he expects to see him soon.

Bob Arnold left Monday for Corpus Christi, Texas, where he is stationed with the Aviation Ground Crew of the Navy Bob played end on the football team for Coquille High before his graduation in 1940. In 1939 Bob made the All-County team.
