Mrs. Bert Dimmick Entertained Here This Week

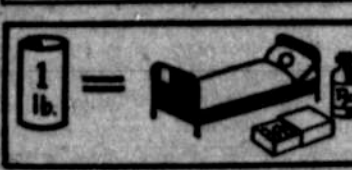
