Mrs. Clara Bell McCool last Saturday received a parcel from her son, Corp. Norman McCool, which she most naturally prizes most highly. Norman is with the Marines who are on duty out in the Pacific and he sent two pictures of his outfit as well as a drawing of himself.

But the most interesting portion of the parcel was a certificate, headed with a picture of Neptune rising from the sea, on which the following wording appeared:

Imperium Neptune Regis. Charles T. Selbig, well-known business man of Coquille and veteran of World War I, has been named a member of the Coos County Veterans' Farm Loan Certifying Committee, announces Edward W. Hughes, County Farm Security Supervisor and secretary of the committee. Authorization for appointment of a business man, preferably a veteran, was made to supplement the present committee of three leading farmers.

Mr. Selbig has been manager of Swift and Company's cheese factory here for sixteen years and is well-known in the county. He has also been active in veterans' affairs and prominently identified with the American Legion and has taken an active part in civic affairs. Present

farmer members of the loan certifying committee include: J. Q. Corrie, Bullards; Ed Detlefsen, Coquille, and J. J. (Bob) Geaney, Coquille. Detlefsen is chairman of the group.

All applications for government-guaranteed farm and farm equipment loans as provided under the GI Bill, will be reviewed by the committee and certified as to experience and ability of the applicant, when the price of the farm equipment or livestock to be purchased is reasonable, and if the purpose of the loan meets all requirements.

Except for handling of administrative matters in connection with the committee's work, certification of GI loan guarantees is entirely separate from Farm Security's regular program of supervised credit which has been in operation for nearly ten years, serving family-type farmers unable to obtain suitable credit from other sources.
