In a recent basketball game which his field team, called the "Wasps," played with the Alos Arms Air Field of Victoria, Texas, team. "Bud" was high man for the evening with 14 field goals and three converted foul shots, for a score of 31. The Wasps won 77 to 62. "Bud" attributes the showing he made in that game to the splendid work "Spike" did as a coach with him in his high school days.

**Paul Pinkston Was In The Bulge Drive In January**

Pfc. Paul Pinkston, of this city, who is with the 41st Cavalry Recon. Sqdrn. of the 11th Armored Division of the Third U. S. Army now in Germany, sends the following clipping from a daily newspaper which tells of the 500-mile dash made by the tanks from the English Channel to the Bulge, in January:

The announcement that the 11th Arm. Div. had played a major role in the fight to save Bastogne revealed new evidence of the mobility of American armored units.

En route to France across the English Channel at the time Von Rundstedt launched his push, the 11th rushed to the Ardennes.

Commanded by Brig. Gen. Charles S. Kilburn, the Thunderbolt Division tanks rolled more than 500 miles after hastily assembling at the beach. Reaching the area of Neuf-chateau Dec. 28, the green tankers clashed in a slugfest the following morning with some of Rudstedt's most seasoned troops.

The mission of the 11th in its first attack was to protect the vital Bastogne-Neufchateau road, the only

ground supply link from Bastogne to Allied armies. Fighting in close co-ordination with the infantry, the 11th smashed the German armor back six miles in four days, capturing numerous towns. Among them were Rehrival, Jodenville, Chenogne, Lavaselle and Mande St. Etienne.

As the Allied nut-cracker closed on the German Bulge, the 11th drove on with other Third Army units and took the towns of Bertogne, Compogne, Rastadt and Velleroux.

**Lt. Russell Kellar Awarded Air Medal In Italy**

Lieutenant Russell F. Kellar, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dewey S. Kellar, of Portland, has been awarded the Air Medal for Meritorious achievement while participating in aerial combat. In the past recent months, Lt. Kellar has been flying with his veteran fighter-bomber group as a combat pilot, taking part in the destruction of enemy communication lines and supply routes in the Po valley in Italy. Lt. Kellar is a graduate of Coquille High School.

**Elvin John Widmark Receives Purple Heart For Dec. 16 Injury**

John Widmark, of this city, recently received the citation, signed by Com. W. B. Phillips, which accompanied the Purple Heart medal award which was issued to his son, Elvin John Widmark, who was wounded in action on Mindoro Island in the Pacific last Dec. 16. He is back on active duty now as coxswain in the U. S. Naval Reserves.

**How to do with eggs**

It times like these it's a wonderful thing to know a lot about eggs— for properly prepared, eggs are the basis for a wide variety of delicious dishes.

**DO YOU KNOW?**

Egg Equivalents

In most recipes calling for egg, medium-size eggs are used as the basis for measurement

4 to 6 whole eggs equal 1 cup  
2 to 10 egg whites equal 1 cup  
10 to 14 egg yolks equal 1 cup

To prevent yolk of hard cooked egg from darkening: Remove from heat and plunge immediately into cold water.

Eggs should not be washed before storage because water removes the protective coating on the shell essential to keeping quality of eggs.

Egg yolks store well when covered with cold water, milk or salad oil; covered tightly and stored in refrigerator.

Egg whites store well when covered tightly and stored in refrigerator.

For best volume egg should be at room temperature before beating.

Eggs should always be cooked at low temperatures as high temperatures toughen the proteins.

**SOLES ON SOFT BUTTER**  
(A way with egg yolks)  
A delicate, smooth sauce

4 egg yolks 2 cups milk  
1/2 cup sugar 1 tsp. vanilla  
1 tsp. salt extract

Beat egg yolks slightly with spoon in top of double boiler; add sugar and salt; mix well; add milk; and cook over rapidly boiling water about 10 to 15 minutes, or until mixture is slightly thickened and coats spoon, stirring occasionally. Remove from stove at once; add flavoring; and pour into cool bowl. Chill before serving. Makes 2 1/2 cups custard.
