TIRE CONSERVATION

In conjunction with National Tire Conservation Week
A letter from The Portland Office, Portland, Oregon.
To Your O. K. Rubber Welders
Timely and essentially important to All car owners is printed below in part as follows:

It is very important to recap synthetic tires before they are worn to the breaker strip; in fact, these tires should be recapped while there is still an outline of the original tread and before the carcass becomes bald. In this manner enough of the original rubber is left as a base to bond the new cap and thus greatly reduce the hazards of separation which has been one of the greatest causes of recap failure. (Unquote)

It is extremely important that every tire be properly repaired, sectioned and in every other way possible run out to the last mile.

Experience has proven that the use of liners whenever possible greatly increases the life of tires that have numerous cracks and small rock holes, or where the cords have pulled loose.
