

Tom Newton Promoted To Rank Of Sergeant In England

The promotion of Thomas J. Newton, 19, from the grade of corporal to sergeant has been announced by Colonel George Y. Jumper, Watoma, California, commander of the 288th Bombardment Group in England, where he is now stationed.

Sgt. Newton, top turret gunner and aerial engineer of an Eighth Air Force B-17 Flying Fortress, is now taking pre-combat training in preparation for defending his Fort during bombing attacks upon German military and industrial installations.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. R. T. Newton, of Coulter Street, Coquille, he was graduated from Coquille High School prior to entering the Army Air Forces in July, 1943.

He attended aircraft mechanics school at Amarillo Field, Texas, and aerial gunnery school at Las Vegas Field, Nevada, receiving his wings in July, 1944.

Private First Class Orville E. Roady, of Coquille, is a motor vehicle driver for an Engineer Battalion at an Eighth Air Force Reconnaissance Wing Headquarters, which station is commanded by Brigadier General Elliott Roosevelt.

Working in a section that maintains rigid schedules of courier service, he delivers film and photographic material for a large photographic laboratory that process aerial photographs of vital German industrial and military targets.

Pfc. Roady entered the army in September, 1942, and has been serving in the European Theatre of Operations since March, 1944. He is the son of M. V. Roady, of Delta, Colorado. He has a brother in the Navy, serving in the South Pacific. He is the husband of Mrs. Miriam R. Roady.

Arthur Wilberger Receives Medal and Star In France

Both boys graduated from Coquille High and have had fine times talking together since they met. Leonard spends many of his passes in London and tells of visiting places of historical interest. These people over here really know what it is to go without things and I've never heard a word of complaint."

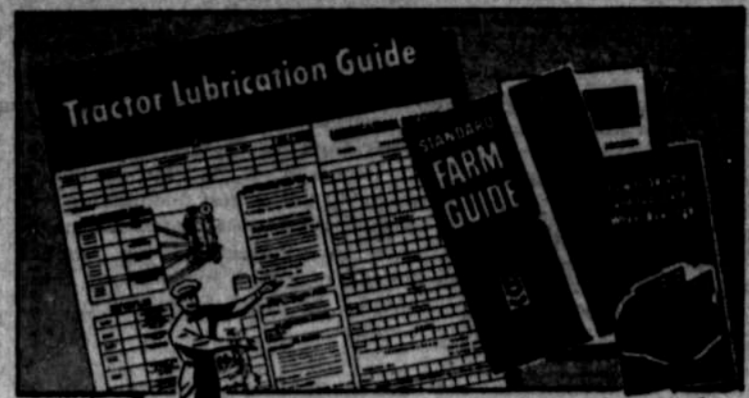
