**Mrs. Graydon Haga**  
Another lovely flower has been taken from us by the grim reaper of death—Lola White Haga is gone. Only a few weeks ago another lovely girl mother was called away. She was June Danielson Church. It is so difficult for us to understand why such precious and beautiful girls must be taken from us when they are still so young. But perhaps "some time we'll understand."

Mrs. Graydon Haga passed away last Wednesday at the Mast Hospital in Myrtle Point and interment was in the Bandon cemetery Saturday afternoon, with Rev. Mr. Stubbs officiating, funeral services being at the Baptist church there. A large crowd came to pay their last respects to a dearly beloved friend, neighbor and schoolmate. The room was banked with a great profusion of flowers.

Lola was born at Langlois Dec. 3, 1925. She entered school as a beginner at Bandon, later going to Coquille, where she attended two terms. The family then moved to Riverton, where she finished grade and high schools. Her brother, Jack White, S2/c, graduated from the eighth grade and high school in her same class. She played on the high school and grade school volleyball teams here and in 1940 helped to win for Riverton the championship of the county. She always held an important officer's position in her class through grade and high school and was yell leader at the high school games.

She and her brother, Jack, graduated from Riverton high school in May, 1944. Her husband, who survives, graduated here in 1941. They were married Feb. 22, 1944, before her graduation. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Charles G. Brown in his home at Coquille and they made their home on Bear Creek.

Besides her husband she is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. White; a sister, Mrs. June Sabin; the brother, Jack, referred to above; and a younger brother, Kenneth Allen, who is six years old and attending school here; also her husband's mother, Mrs. Wava Chesley Haga, of Bear Creek. Her husband's father was killed in action on the battlefield last July.

This entire community has been shocked and saddened by the sudden passing of this lovely girl.

**In Circuit Court On Tuesday**

Henry Wagner, indicted Feb. 21 for driving an auto while under the influence of liquor, pleaded guilty in circuit court on Tuesday and was fined \$100 and sentenced to 30 days in jail by Judge King. The jail sentence was suspended when he paid his fine.

This is the Boeing B-29 Superfortress, the new aerial dreadnaught which carries the greatest load faster, farther and higher than any other airplane in existence. Its wing span is 141 ft. 3 in., length 99 ft., and height 27 ft. 9 in. The plane is pressurized for high altitude operation, first combat bomber in history so equipped. The B-29 carries its bombs in two separate bomb bays. The plane is being built at Boeing plants in Seattle, Renton, Washington, and Wichita, Kansas, at the Martin plant in Omaha, Nebraska, and the Bell factory in Marietta, Georgia.

**Geo. Oerding Sells Business Building and Coquille Residence**

Mr. Kelley will move into his newly purchased home as soon as he sells his place of 1½ acre of land, located about two miles out of town on the Fairview road.
